



Ruffalo Noel Levitz conducted an Early-Alert College Completion Risk Survey and Self-Assessment in 2016 to nearly 100,000 entering college freshman. Below are the percentages of students attitudes about their skills from the report identified above:

61%

said they would like help selecting an educational plan that will prepare them to get a good job

59% said they pick-up vocabulary words quickly and find it easy to use them in speech and writing



61% said they communicated very well and had a good understanding of others point of view


59% said they are capable of writing very clear and well-organized papers

- IT uploads the directory to the WCCCD website





WCCCD's Dental Clinic is Open!


WCCCD's Dental Clinic is open during the summer semester to the public. All services are provided by students and faculty. The services are supervised by licensed dental hygienists and dentists.


Information Technology Institute








Legislative Corner

Three-Year Cohort Default Rate by Sector



Source: Association of Community College Trustees (May 2017). Lost in the Trillion: A Three-State Comparison of Community College Borrowing and Default. Study found that defaults are concentrated among low-balance borrowers, with the majority of defaulters borrowing less than \$5,000 while enrolled in community college. A growing body of research identifies low-debt borrowers as being the most vulnerable.

Campus Speech Bills Introduced

Three bills were introduced that would be potentially problematic for community colleges in Michigan. Senate Bill 349 and House Bill 4581 both would create the Campus Free Speech Act, creating strict limitations on speech-related policies at public colleges and universities. Senate Bill 350 would require any community college accepting state funds to submit to a number of policies regarding free expression, as well as a Higher Education Committee on Free Expression in the Department of Education. The Michigan Community College Association staff is working to determine whether leadership in either chamber has an intent to act on these bills.
