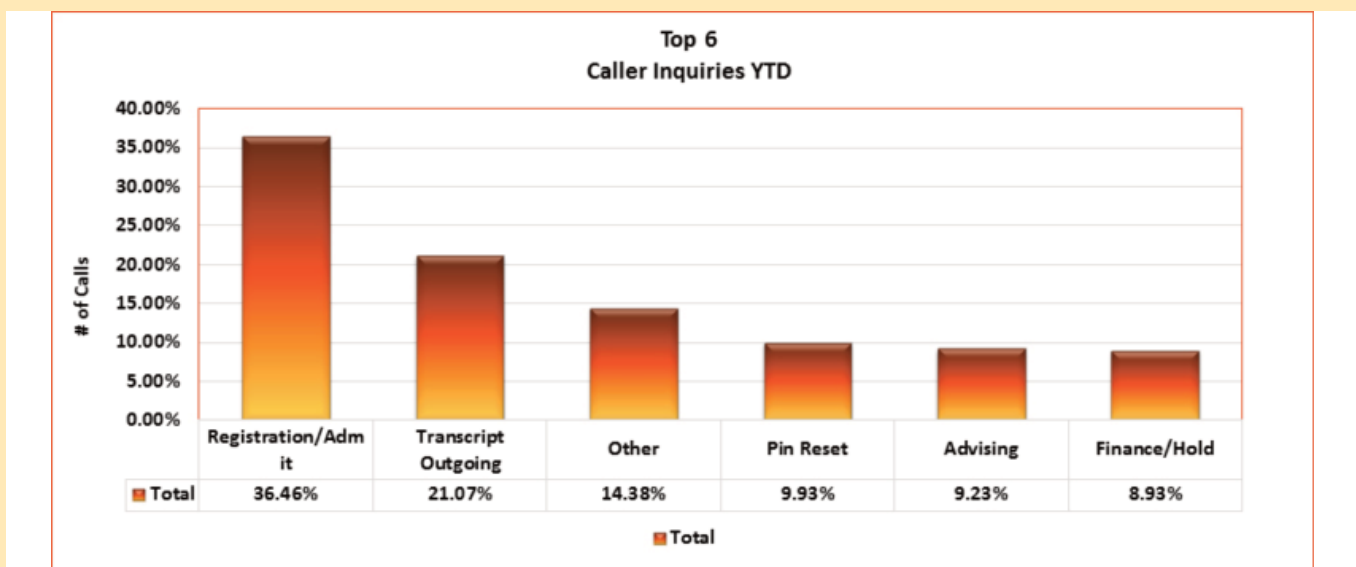

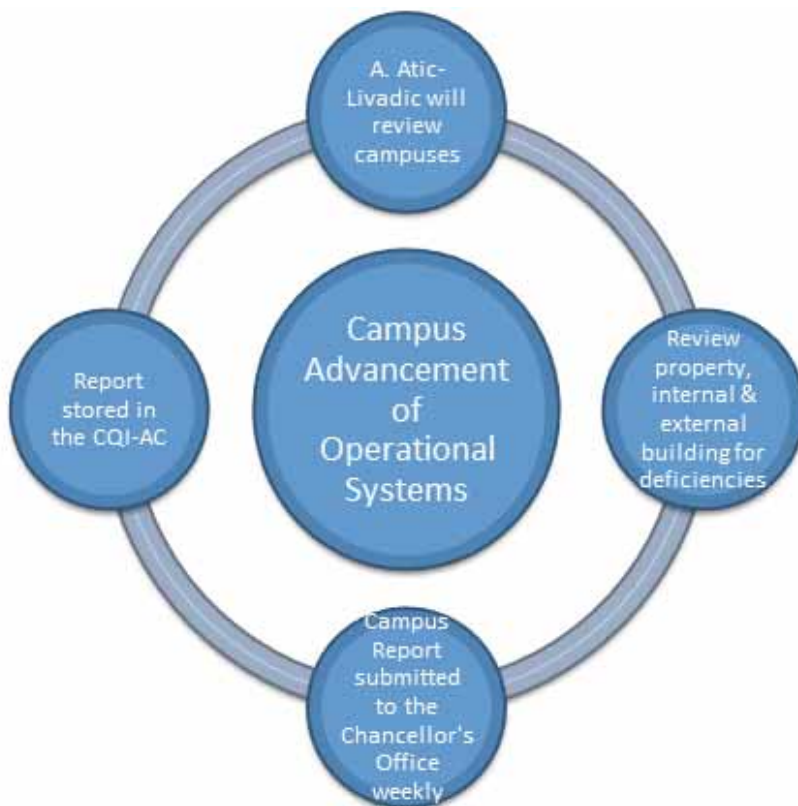
Continuous Quality Improvement

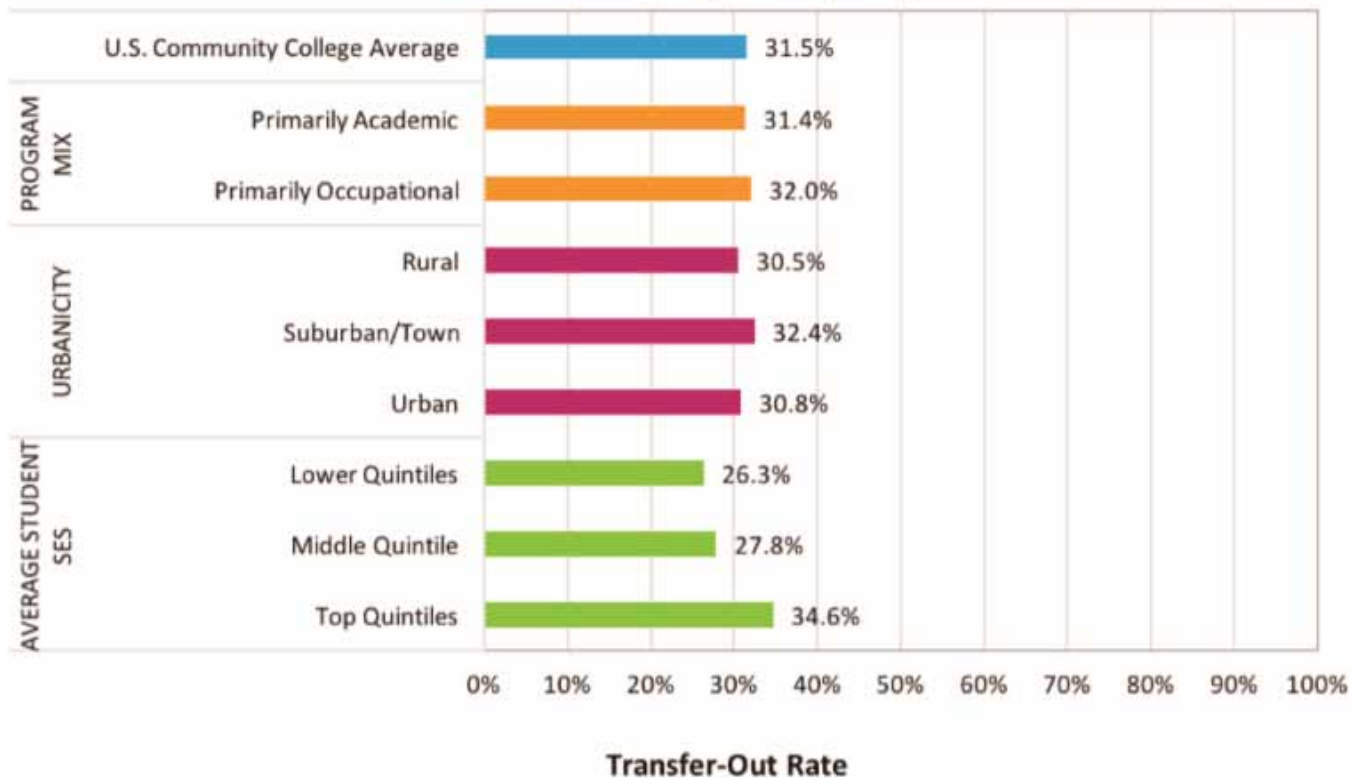

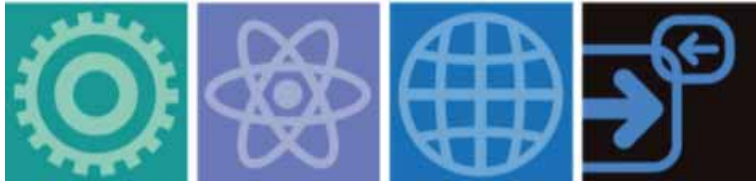

Figure 1. Average Transfer-Out Rates by Institutional Characteristics (N=852,439)*



Source: Fewer students are transferring from community colleges to four-year colleges and universities, according to a new report from the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) Research Center. Out of 852,439 students who first enrolled at a community college in fall 2010, 31.5% transferred to a four-year institution within six years. Previously, the transfer rate was 33% percent for the fall 2007 cohort.

The Heinz C. Prechter Educational and Performing Arts Center presented the second and final installment of Karl Schmidt's “Broadway – The American Musical Theatre.”



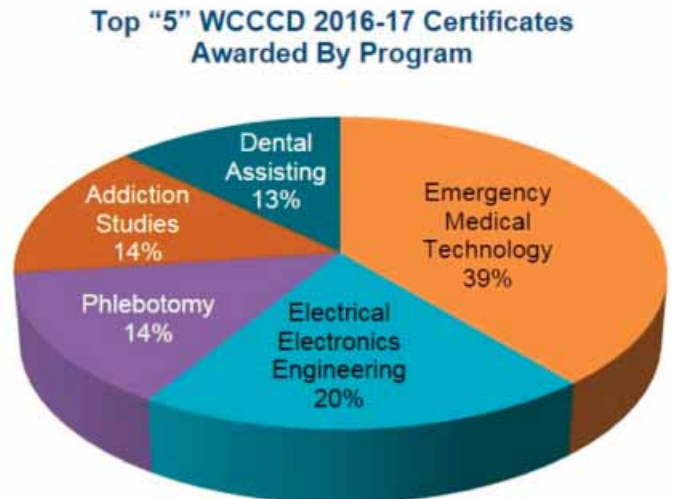
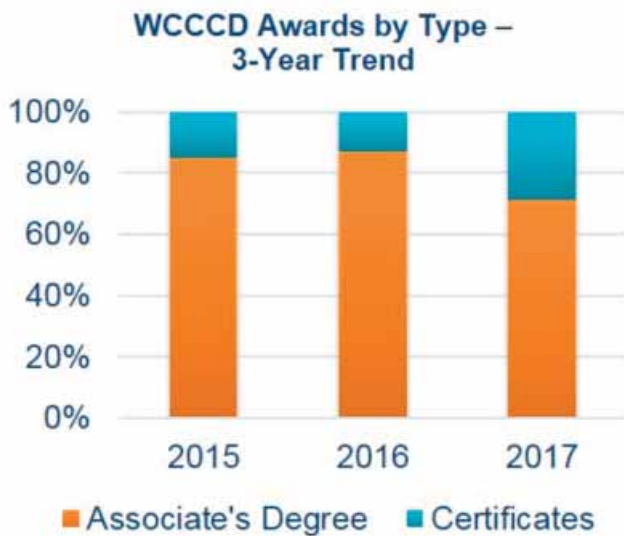


Division of Institutional Effectiveness

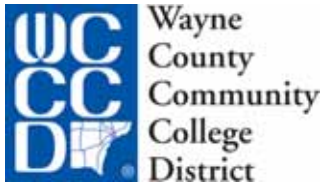
