





Online Course Design





Clarify student learning objectives. Determine possible online course delivery methods and technology requirements.



Good online pedagogy starts with good pedagogy. Map out your course by matching the learning objectives with selected instructional strategies and assessments.





Once you've built a steady frame for your course, the next step is to build a course site that is a welcoming and easy to use virtual learning space.

4. DELIVER



For successful course delivery, allow time for the course introduction; foster student engagement and interactions during the semester: effectively facilitate online discussions; and implement course and time management strategies.

5. EVALUATE



Assessment should be present throughout the course development and implementation process: from course needs to student learning and course effectiveness.



WCCCD is one of the 28 Michigan community colleges participating in the Michigan Colleges Online (MCO) OER initiative. The MCO created the Michigan Colleges Online OER Hub for our member institutions as a way to reduce costs for students, increase student success and completion, and allow for inter-institutional collaboration with faculty.

Transfer Programs



WCCCD transfer degrees provide students with the skills to think critically and cover a range of diverse topics such as humanities, social and natural science, and language which develops writing and communication skills. In addition, transfer degree core classes build upon the students' general knowledge and provide the skills and abilities needed to work with others, interpret information, and make well-reasoned decisions

Learning Resource Center

The Collection Development Cycle is crucial in determining what the extent and strength of our campus collections that support the District curricula. Currently, all campus Learning Resource Centers are working concurrently in the following phases:

- 1. **Weed or replace-** this phase involves identifying items that are no longer useful based on currency of information, condition of the book, or relevance to campus collections.
- 2. **Selection-** allows LRC staff to research more current books available based on the distinct campus program curricula.
- 3. **Acquisitions-** to secure these items for campus collections.


Community College 101


