


Division of Institutional Effectiveness **How Do You Measure Student**

Division of Institutional Effectiveness How Does WCCCD Measure Student Success?

WCCCD provides measures of student success to external agencies such as IPEDS, CEPI, Governor's Dashboard, HLC, and the state of Michigan. Below are comparisons with other institutions that report to IPEDS as well as additional data points that demonstrate student success. *The Department of Education National Center for Education Statistics (IPEDS) is considered the official source for all community colleges completion data*.




National Research reports that community college students that complete 15 or more credits are more likely to earn degrees.






Division of Educational Affairs

Learning Resource Center Ebsco Database Technology



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Phishing attacks often use fake URLs to make you think that you are on a different site than the one you are one. URLs, such as "http://subdomain.domain.com/folder/page.html", are comprised of specific parts: the protocol ("http://"), the domain ("subdomain.domain.com"), directories ("/folder/") and finally a page ("page.html"). The domain is the part of the URL that you must pay attention to and it is only the part after the "http://" and before the first forward

slash ("/"). "http://www.bank.com" is a domain on "bank.com," but "http://wwwbank.com" and "http://www.bank.co/m" are both entirely different domains. Many organizations are moving to a secure domain structure. HTTPS: indicates that the URL is using proper encryption to protect users and the organization. Try to always use HTTPS if possible.
