

GED students from the Mercy Education Project Adult Education Center toured the Downtown Campus. The students received information on the career education programs offered at the District.












Wildcats Sophmore Night




INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS






Wayne RESA Transportation Supervisors Training


