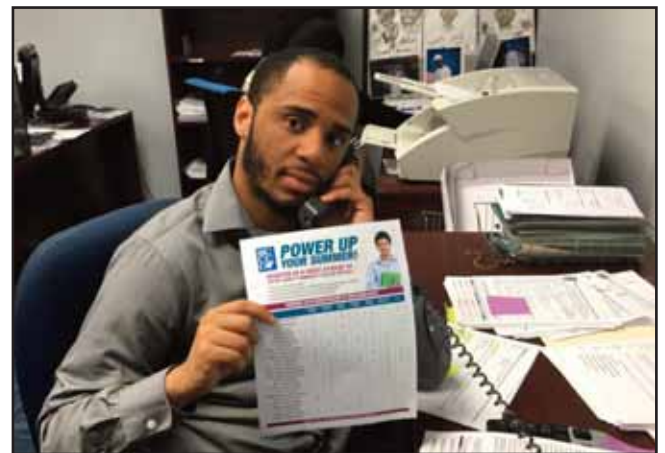

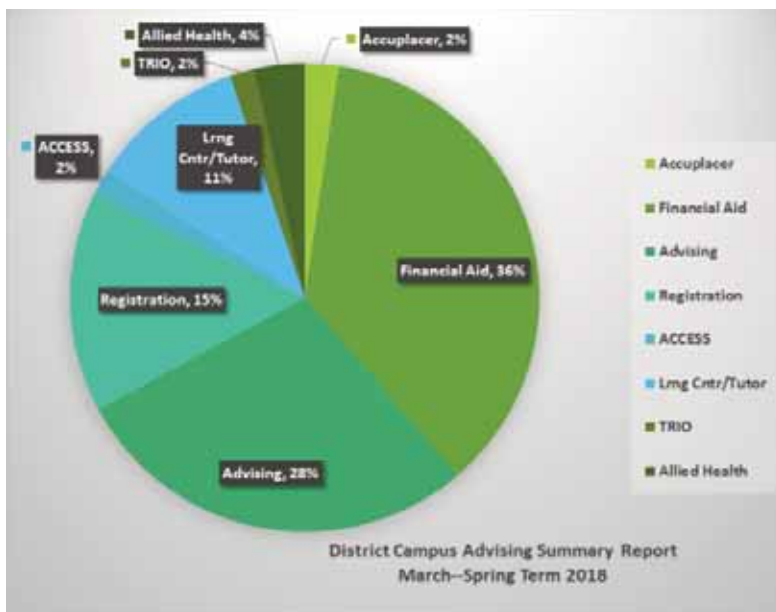
Academic Adviser Training

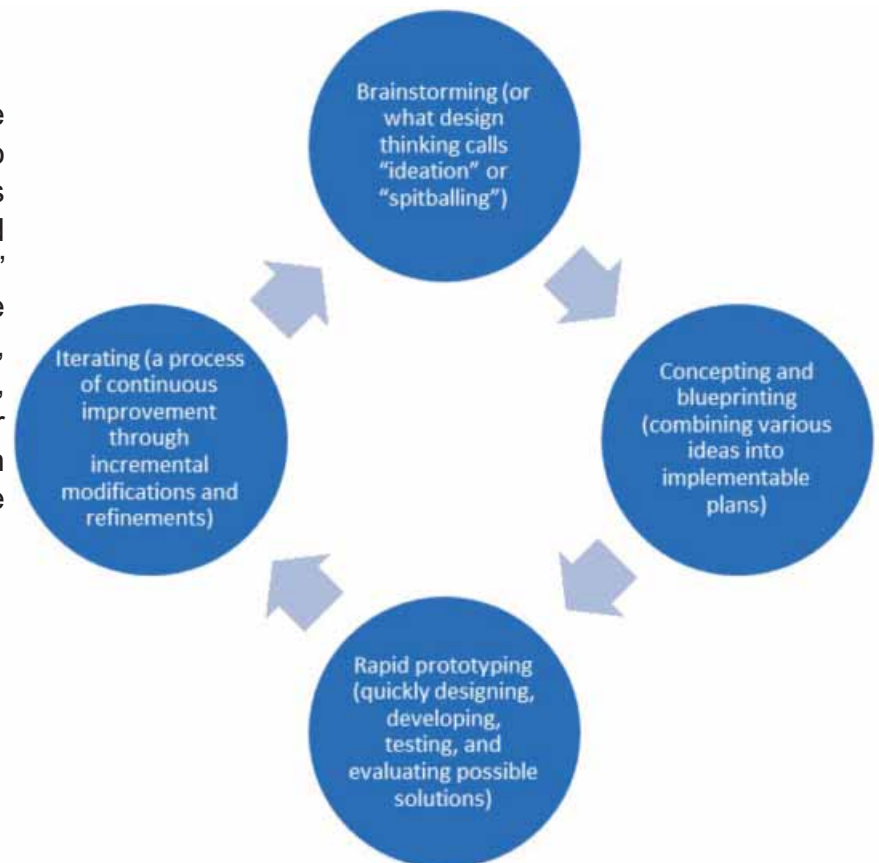

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) reviews national data to assist divisions, programs, and the district with program offerings and services.

According to O*Net (Occupational Information Network) and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), the average growth rate for some of the fastest growing occupations is 15%. WCCCD offers programs directly related to many of these growing careers. As an example, the average employment change rate is +55,000 jobs by 2026, while truck drivers will see job growth of over 100,000 jobs by 2026. 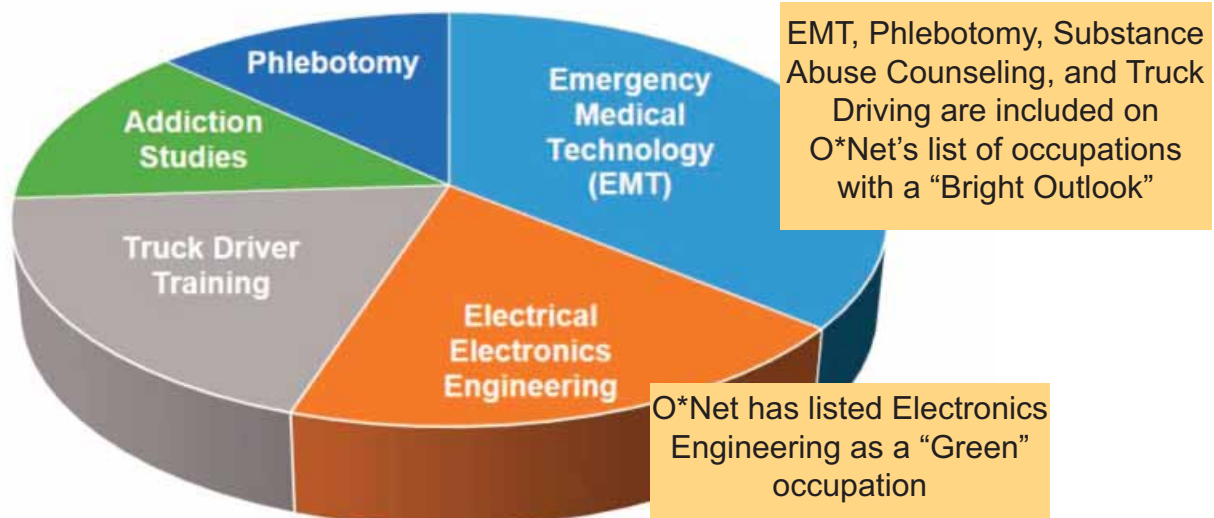

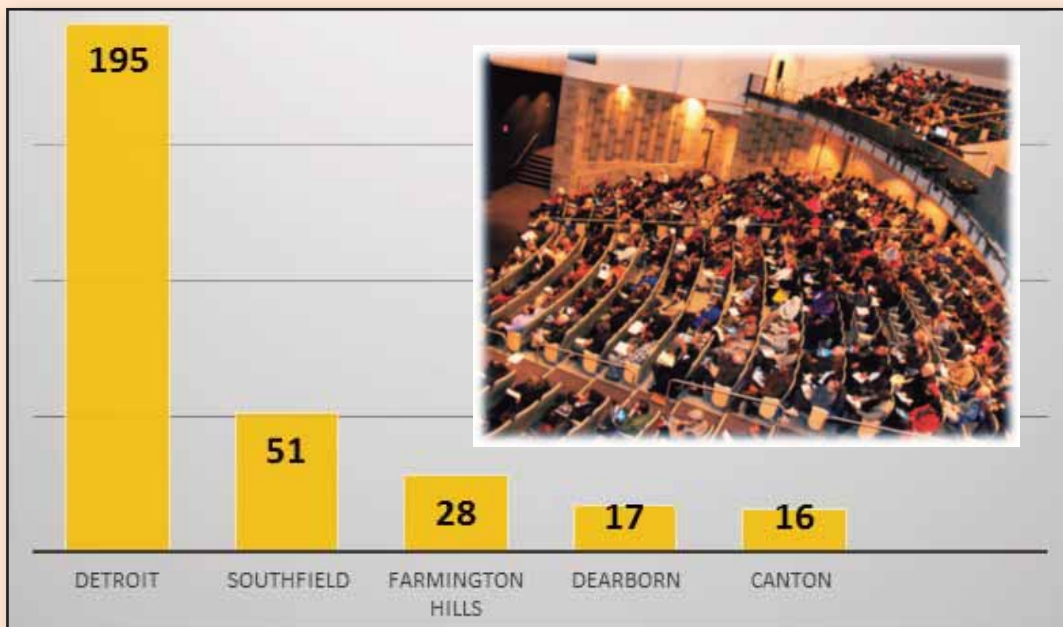
Educational Affairs and Student Services Working Together

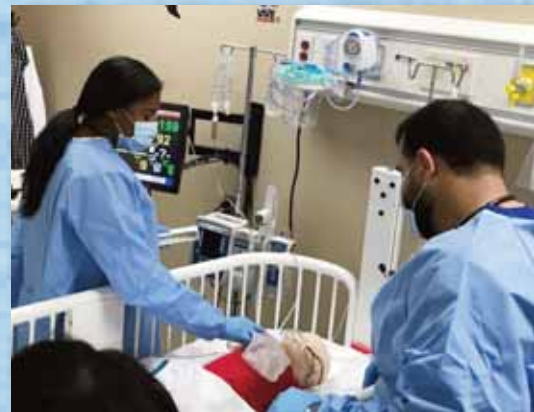

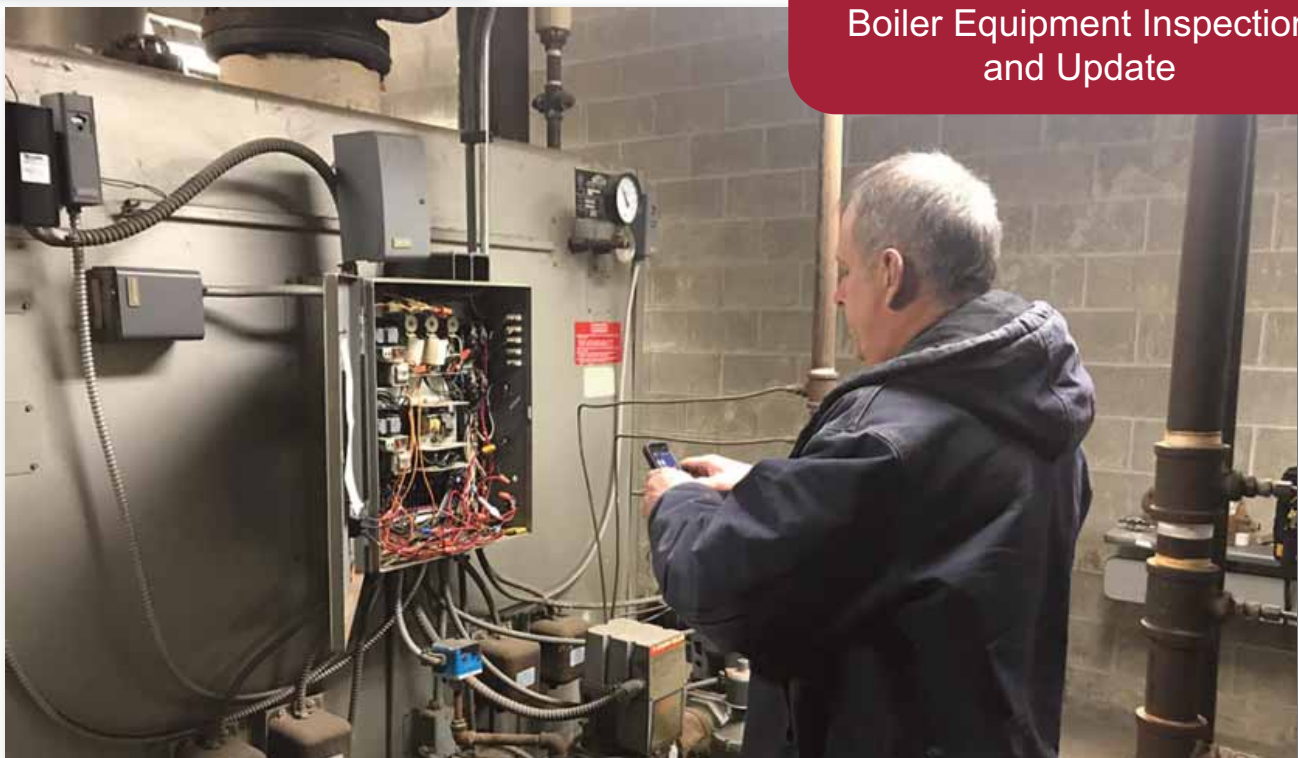

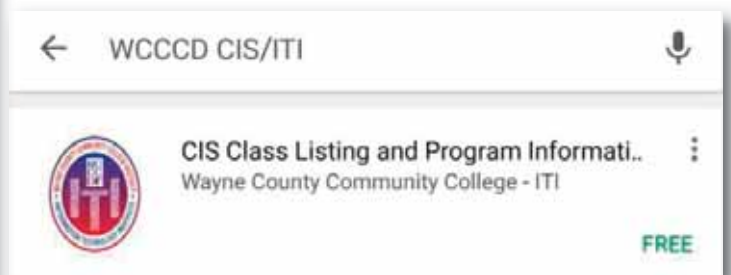


We Have an App For That!

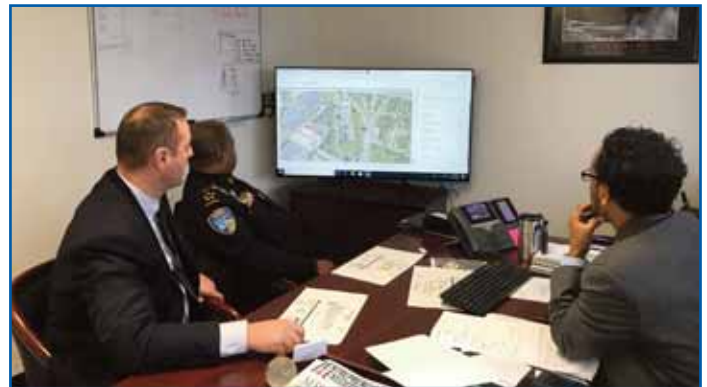


Happening now!!

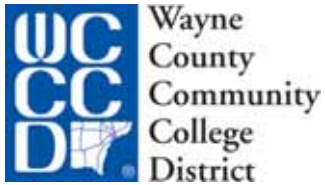
