The Health Science Center hosted a simulation, which was designed to allow students to follow a patient from the time of injury or illness through the different stages of recovery to discharge.



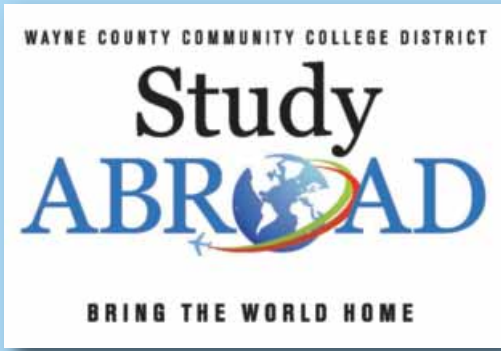
WCCCD Recognized for Larry K. Lewis Education Center at the Northwest Campus Only LEED Platinum Structure in Detroit!

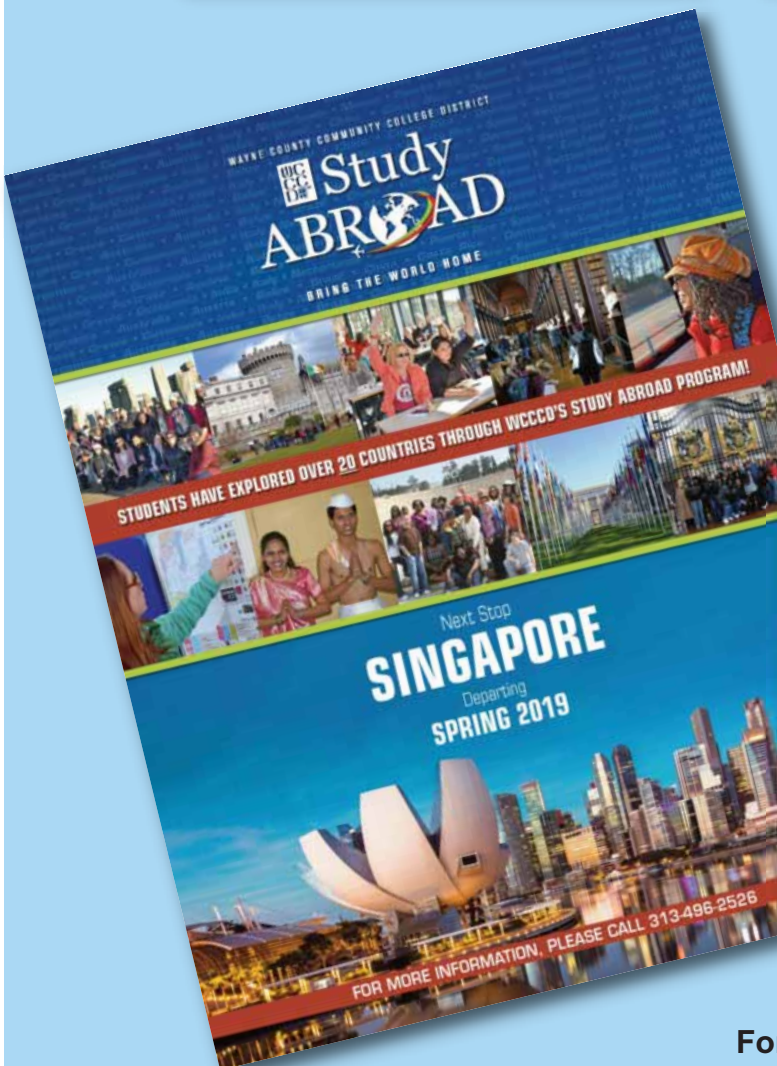

Transfer Credit Evaluation Process

The Division of Student Services receives official transcripts from around the world from students requesting to transfer into WCCCD. Transcripts are evaluated for credit upon receipt of the Request for Transcript Evaluation form. The maximum transferable number of credits is 45 hours. Students must complete 12 credit hours at WCCCD before their transferable credits are posted to their academic history.

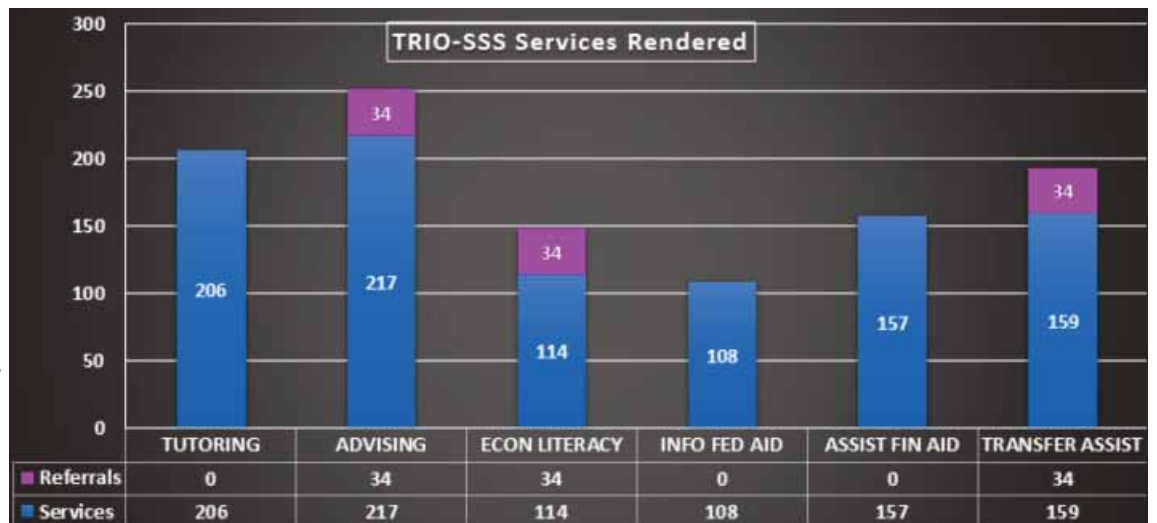

Chief Darrick Muhammad, Captain Bahrija Livadic, Melvin Cartwright and his team met to discuss future technological security operational planning.

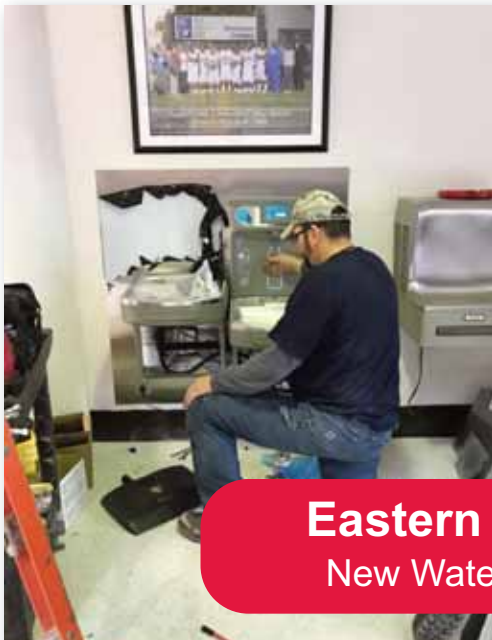

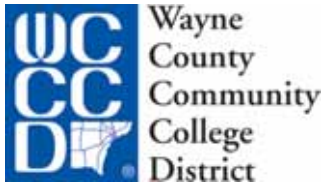


Skilled Trade Enrollment Assistance Program (STEAP)
