





Michigan College and University Partnership with Michigan Technological University











As part of the Michigan College and University Partnership with Michigan Technological University, WCCCD students finalized their seven-week paid internship as they displayed their research projects and answered related questions.






Division of Student Services Functions - Consumer Information



Updated Textbook Review



Now is the time for faculty to receive the updated copies of their textbooks and prepare their syllabi for Fall 2019. Instructor's can request an Instructor's copy textbook through the below process:

- ✓ The request may be sent directly from an instructor to the Division of Educational Affairs or through the Campus President's Office.
- Once received, a confirmation email is sent to the requestor.
- ✓ The Educational Affairs representative confirms instructor assignment.
- ✓ Once confirmed, the request is sent to the Purchasing Departmentt.
- ✓ The textbook is ordered through the Purchasing Department.
- ✓ The hard copy textbook is shipped directly to instructor's home address and a digital copy to their email.
- ✓ In certain cases, the book may need to be purchased and picked up at the campus bookstore.

Dr. Abby Freeman met with staff from the Surgical Technology and Dental programs to review student applications for Fall 2019.






The nursing staff participated in the Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) live stream addressing the needs of the population seeking treatment of opioid use disorders.



Karen LaBelle attended Kim Keys, City of Romulus Business Manager retirement celebration.






Boy Scouts of America


Cass Tech Bridge Program
