


Financial Aid Marathon


The Northwest Campus continued discussions with the faculty regarding information on the student success toolkit through the District Success Center.




Career Spotlight




Open Education Week

Humanities instructors met to discuss textbook options. Participants brainstormed the pros and cons from current selections to decide which textbook would be best for upcoming courses.



Tips for Making Your Courses More Accessible

- 1. Write Clealy and Simply
 - Write in active voice and remove unnecessary verbiage.
- 2. Consider Color Carefully
 - Make sure there is enough contrast between your text and the background.
- 3. Use Headings
 - Write clear, descriptive headings in your documents and Blackboard content.
- 4. Use Descriptive Link Text
 - Use link text that describes the purpose of the link.
- 5. Provide Alternative Text
 - Provide alternative (alt text) for non-decorative images embedded in Blackboard.
- 6. Look for Closed Captions
 - Ensure closed captions are provided in the video or audio assets you include in your courses.
- 7. Simplify Your Table Structure
 - Screen readers read each cell of a table from left to right and from top to bottom, so the simpler, the better.




Community College 101







The enrollment represents the activity from Monday-Satruday for the week of **February 25- March 2, 2019** at each campus.






