

HR Compliance Data Integrity and Automation

In preparation for faculty payroll for Fall 2019, the Division of Human Resources, with the assistance from the Division of Administration and Finance conducted comprehensive faculty payroll and assignment audit. All faculty were required to verify and certify their Spring 2019 instructional class load assignment controls.

Benefits of Payroll Audit

- Prevent payroll fraud by weeding out ghost employees or mismarked time sheets
- Catch manual errors made when entering numbers into a system
- Remove any highlighted terminated employees from your payroll
- Spot calculation mistakes if any
- Verify tax withholdings
- Accurately account for paid or unpaid time off
- Compare hours paid to when employees clocked in
- Ensure you are compliant with employment laws
















Continuing Education Taskforce

Trenton High School Criminal Justice Dual Enrollment Class




