

- Creating a diverse and inclusive educational environment










Diesel Mechanic Training Completion Ceremony

The District Financial Aid Department offers students information on responsible borrowing. There are options to choose from for repayment of student loans.





Division Collaboration



The Divisions of Educational Affairs and Student Services collaborate on reigniting the Learning Communities across the District. Learning Communities utilize a restructured curriculum to link together courses or course work so that students can focus on the learning goals and find greater coherence in what they are learning as well as experience increased interaction with faculty and fellow students.

Evening Deans

"Sometimes it seems there aren't enough hours in the day to get it all done."

The evening dean provides additional administrative and instruction support to faculty and serve as the central point of contact for evening student issues. Providing alternatives to daytime services on our campuses is now even more of a priority than ever. The District is piloting the use of an evening dean to be assigned to each campus to oversee the evening services and community events. This pilot demonstrates progress in raising the bar of continuous improvement across the District and our commitment to our evening students.

General Education Courses



The value of general education courses is that they teach students critical thinking and transferable skills that apply to many careers where students are viewed as a better-rounded student by employers. WCCCD offers more than 20 major discipline areas within the general education category including English, Speech, Physics, Math, Natural Science, Social Science, Humanities, etc.

Learning Resource Center



The Learning Resource Centers hold several workshops for students, faculty, and staff. The schedule of workshops is available at http://www.wccd.edu/dept/lrc_events.html. Such topic areas include:

- Getting to know the LRC which covers the basics of using LRC resources and register students for their library card.
- How to Avoid Plagiarism is designed as an educational tool for students to learn about plagiarism: (What is it, how to avoid doing it, what happens to students when they are accused of plagiarizing, where to get help and advice regarding issues related to plagiarism.
- Understanding APA / MLA style for writing papers to avoid plagiarism.
- Library card usage, photocopying in the LRC. Use the library catalog to look up books.
- Online databases (scholarly journals and remote access)
- Use of Interlibrary Loan



The Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus LRC began orientations and information sessions. Orientations can be designed for a specific course and feature like finding credible sources, writing styles, and critical thinking. Participants learned the various services provided by the LRC including library catalog, ask-a-librarian, electronic books, online journals, remote access as well additional learning tools.



Data Request Process for Institutional Data

As part of the process for evaluating programs, many requests are submitted for review by the Division of Educational Affairs to gather data to inform planning, measure student outcomes, and determine program performance. Critical program activities may include but are not limited to program development, program reviews, annual planning, schedule development, student outreach, retention initiatives and

catalog updates require data and information from Institutional Effectiveness upon request. Pending approval, the Division of Institutional Effectiveness may process all approved requests within 10-15 days. 
