


This week, I had a zoom meeting with Wayne County Executive Warren Evans to discuss the outdoor classroom initiative.



# Tree Trimming Program

WCCCD's Talent & Economic Opportunity and RTC team members continue meeting discussions to launch a Tree Trimming Program at the soon to be developed Outdoor Training Center located at WCCCD's former NW Campus at Greenfield & Joy Road.



Tree Trimming Outlook - (Bureau of Labor Statistics)

Using sophisticated climbing and rigging techniques, cut away dead or excess branches from trees or shrubs to maintain right-of-way for roads, sidewalks, or utilities, or to improve appearance, health, and value of tree. Prune or treat trees or shrubs using handsaws, hand pruners, clippers, and power pruners. Works off the ground in the tree canopy and may use truck-mounted lifts.



One camp will be for 6-8th grade students while a 9th grade camp will provide students

with unique "work-based" and "coding" learning experiences.

The latter camp will also be supplemented with local industry and corporate content contributions.



The Division of Human Resources is currently reviewing, reconciling and auditing its processes, procedures and protocols for timely and correctly reporting for the District, state and federal compliance.








**SSOI Survey:** The Student Survey of Instruction, or SSOI, is a survey of each class offered during a semester focused narrowly in the instructional technique used in class.



# WHAT MADE AMERICAN NEWSPAPERS GREAT?

While many Americans today claim their primary source of news is from social media, it may serve us well to reflect on how the sharing of news and opinions got their start: in newspapers. According to John Steele Gordon in his article "Political Neutrality is What Made American Newspapers Great," Wall Street Journal, July 11-12, 2020, A13; "many of America's great newspapers today have moved away from even the pretense of political neutrality."

That tradition of political neutrality dates to 1835, when Scottish immigrant James Gordon Bennett founded the New York Herald, which had the largest circulation in the world by his death in 1872. "Bennett anticipated a rising middle class that would dominate the Victorian Age, and he wanted to move upmarket from papers with a narrower focus and carry serious news about the real world for an upwardly mobile readership."


Despite a shaky start, the New York Herald ventured into new territory in 1836 thanks to one of the most famous murder cases of the 19th century. The murder of a young prostitute in an upscale brothel and the blaming of a young, wealthy and handsome man helped move respectable newspapers to cover scandalous material involving sex, bloodshed, violence, and wealth. A witness interview appeared in a newspaper for the first time. The Herald's circulation skyrocketed, and the paper expanded to become the "first general-interest newspaper to include a weather report, provide sports coverage and include a daily stock table. It was also the first to include an illustration in a story."

Bennett added foreign correspondents following a trip to Europe, and he was the first to interview a "president who was still in office when he nabbed an exclusive with Martin Van Buren in 1838." He also used the telegraph and pony express and coined the word "leak" in journalism.

The press's power to influence public opinion came from what was likely Bennett's "greatest journalistic idea of all: He made the Herald politically neutral, printing opinion columns only on the editorial page. In his news pages he printed what he thought the readers would want to know, not what he wanted to tell them."

Given our non-stop, 24-hour news cycle, we all have both a challenge and responsibility to think critically about what we read and hear as "news" versus opinion. It is prudent for us to examine multiple sources of electronic and print media to determine our best judgement of what the truth is on any topic.

Recommended book for the month: Washington, by Ron Chernow- the book combines a revealing look at history with outstanding leadership principles.




