# Lessons from COVID-19 Regarding Remote Learning to Help Guide Our Future

As we plan to welcome back students for the Fall 2020 semester with a full slate of on-site and face-to-face instructional programs as well as distance learning offerings, there are cues that we should take from the remote learning experiments we have seen around the country in K-12 education. Since these students may eventually become our students, what can we learn from their experiences to help them become more successful when they are sitting in our classrooms?

"America's Great Experiment in Remote Learning Fails," by Tawnell D. Hobbs and Lee Hawkins, Wall Street Journal, June 6-7, 2020 provides extensive information about how "when schools shut down, problems piled up for students and teachers." Given the geographic diversity across the country and across Michigan, "school districts didn't realize the number of students without access to devices and the internet until they surveyed parents... About 9.7 million students aren't connected to the internet, according to an estimate by the Education Super Highway, a nonprofit focused on connectivity in public schools... As a nation, we were not prepared to take learning online, said founder and CEO Evan Marwell."

As with any topic, it is important to take a balanced approach to guide our thought process. Some areas of the country did experience great success with remote learning. Alaska, by geographic necessity, has been one of the nation's leaders in distance education dating back to the 1980's if not before. "One of America's Remotest States Makes Remote Learning Work," by Kimberley A. Strassel, Wall Street Journal, May 16-17, 2020, outlines how teachers and administrators in one suburban Anchorage school "reached out to every family to find out their needs. Laptops? Access to internet? Food assistance? Did they prefer online teaching, or textbooks?" The teachers "inspired kids to embrace the new reality." Strassel answers the question of "what accounts for this success? One big factor is school choice...the district has welcomed diversity, creating a blended system. The other big factor is the district's impressive employees."

There is much to learn from what our nation and Michigan have just experienced since March, 2020, and we need to put those lessons to good use as we move forward.



#### **Distance Learning**



Below you will find some sample data points on WCCCD distance learning student enrollment for the past three years for degree\certificate seeking students only:


#### DEGREE\CERTIFICATE SEEKING STUDENTS (ONLY)

# Legislative Corner

#### From the Michigan Community College Association

#### **Committee Advances Summer Property Tax Relief**

The House Committee on Local Government and Municipal Finance reported out substitutes for House Bills 5761 and 5810 (Lower). Together, the bills would create a mechanism for eligible taxpayers who have endured economic hardship due to Covid-19 to delay payment of their summer 2020 property taxes without incurring penalties or interest, while the state would create a delinquent tax payment fund to reimburse local entities for those charges as well as assisting with cash flow from later payments. The bills now go to the House Appropriations Committee.



Some welcome good news from Lansing last week as the Senate Education Committee reported MCCA-supported legislation to include grade point average as a factor for determining eligibility for dual enrollment for next year. This legislation should provide options to many students who would have otherwise been denied eligibility due to the suspension of almost all traditional test score opportunities. Have a great week, everyone.

#### Committee Expands Dual Enrollment Eligibility

The Senate Education and Career Readiness Committee reported out House Bills 4546 and 4547, both of which amend Michigan's dual enrollment laws. In addition to the original changes in the bills, which deal with the timing of eligible courses, MCCA staff were able to secure amendments to both bills that will allow students to use a GPA of 2.5 or higher, as an alternative to a qualifying score on an exam, to establish eligibility for dual enrollment during the coming year. This change was identified as important due to the delay in school-based SAT and PSAT administration from spring to fall this year, although K-12 school groups have pledged to have a deeper conversation about use of GPA as a qualifier in future school years as well. Both bills now go to the full Senate for approval.
