







Detroit Teen to Represent Students on Governor's Return-to-School Council

The governor-appointed Return to Learn Advisory Council is working to develop guidelines for returning to school. Whitmer noted the safety precautions for schools could include smaller class sizes. Whitmer said she expects to announce by the end of the month a plan to restart in-person instruction in schools throughout the state. It is likely to vary by region. gonzales said the council will work on issues from June to December and so far has had meetings via Zoom and phone calls. Its work is confidential, he said.



"Dominic Gonzales, who works at McDonald's and is part of the district's dual enrollment program that allows him to attend **Wayne County Community College District** during high school, said he was not expecting to be selected for the council and was thrilled when he was notified by the district. "It feels good to put myself out there and help others when everything is so uncertain," he said. "They are very interested in what I have to say at the meeting. I can participate and be a huge voice in this along with the Legislature and health officials." Whitmer's "Return to School Roadmap" will address health and safety requirements with which schools must comply as well as potential differences depending on region and coronavirus activity."

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

The Division of Student Services continues to reach out remotely to students to assist with their registration processes for successful Summer and Fall 2020 semesters. Staff has assisted students with returning and obtaining textbooks, transcript requests, pin resets, advising, plan of work, financial aid, and distance learning questions.





Talent and Economic Opportunity

Members of WCCCD and the Talent and Economic Opportunity held a strategy meeting to review the program's launch. The Talent and Economic Opportunity planning meeting, chaired by Reggie Armstrong, focused on online and hybrid CTE/skill training

programs that lead participants to in-demand jobs, apprenticeships and economic opportunities as a business or subcontractor. All programs target adult and youth populations and offer online learning programs, CTE career pathway and exploration workshops, job readiness preparation, pre-apprenticeship training, work experience/internships and support necessary for student success.





Commercial Drivers License Program

CDL vehicles have been returned from inspection as Instructors record the pre-trip inspection video that will be used as a part of the online training instructional materials for the next cohort starting in July. Currently 12 confirmed (8 pending) participants have complete the online application and vetting process for the next cohort maximum of 15 trainees in the new hybrid program.






Educational Affairs Staff as a Resource for Faculty







Florence Nightingale: The "Lady with the Lamp" and her Lessons for Today

Britain recently celebrated Florence Nightingale's 200th birthday on May 12th. While she shunned the spotlight, when she returned to England after the Crimean War, she was the most famous woman in England after Queen Victoria.

Nightingale's fame and impact stem from her role, beginning in 1854, when she spent two years in the conflict zone caring for wounded and sick British troops outside of Constantinople. British troops had invaded the Russian-held Crimean Peninsula in response to aggressive moves by Czar Nicholas I to expand his territory.

Having 38 nurses under her command, she ministered to troops packed in squalid wards, many of them wracked by frostbite, gangrene, dysentery, and cholera. She collected and reported data shedding light on what needed to be improved in the hospitals. As a result of her efforts and example, she was able to show the direct relationship between improved sanitation and plummeting death rates.

Nightingale "produced findings on the proportion of recoveries and deaths from various diseases, average disease recovery times according to patients' age and gender, and high rates of communicable diseases among hospital workers."

Nightingale founded England's first nurses' training school, at St. Thomas Hospital in London. She viewed the project "as a moral crusade intended to promote the honest employment ... to elevate in purifying...a number...of poor and virtuous women," she wrote at the time, according to the March, 2020 Smithsonian.

Due to that early action, she is credited with founding the modern nursing profession, standardizing the wearing of uniforms and introducing practices that are now customary. Given Florence Nightingale's early use of data in tracking and tracing the deaths and recoveries of patients, we can clearly see her impact on modern medicine and how medical professionals are addressing COVID-19 in the United States and across the world.




