



RTC reached out to congressional representatives to check on the status of Senate Bill 839 which will allow Pell Grant eligibility for short-term certificate programs.

Staff from the Regional Training Center (RTC) reached out to the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) regarding their program Expand Community College Apprenticeships (ECCA). They were seeking to gain more details in an effort to work with local unions and employers to develop a training pipeline.

The ECCA initiative is led by the AACC with funding from the U.S. Department of Labor to increase the number of apprentice programs and services throughout the country. The ECCA project will be conducted over three years and will train 16,000 apprentices.

SUBJECT: Message to All Members of the WCCCD Family Regarding the Coronavirus (COVID-19)


WCCCD continues to follow the guidance of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, the Office of the Governor and the Wayne County Health Department. WCCCD is taking measures to protect its communities while continuing to deliver courses and services in a manner that is appropriate given the current circumstances. We are closely monitoring the global developments associated with the coronavirus (COVID-19) and are taking proactive steps in response to assure the health and wellbeing of our students, faculty and staff, and the communities we serve.

Effective Thursday, March 12, beginning at 4 p.m., all face-to-face classes will be suspended until Sunday, March 22, 2020, while on-line classes and off-site clinicals will continue as usual. The suspension period will give us time to work with our faculty and staff to make this challenging transition of our teaching and learning modalities. During the suspension of on-campus, face-to-face instruction, District and campus services will continue as normal. Effective March 23, 2020, all face-to-face classes will have been transitioned to alternative methods of instructional delivery.

We are working continuously to prepare for the unprecedented and urgent situation caused by the coronavirus and will be in communication with students, faculty and staff, and other members of the WCCCD family as we collectively address the challenges before us. 


The documentary film "The Last Mountain" was viewed at the Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus.

The District Communication Management Center staff assists and disburses incoming calls District-wide. This graph represents a breakdown of how each call was processed.




