Pivoting your Business to Thrive in a New Environment

WCCCD's Regional Training Center and Talent and Economic Development Office collaborated with Detroit Talent Hub to customize a 100% online Intro to Entrepreneurship training program for Detroit at Work. Over forty participants will be enrolled in this pilot program to gain knowledge, skills, and resources to enhance their entrepreneurial business pursuit and learn how to pivot in this COVID-19 pandemic environment. The program begins November 17, 2020, and will run for two cohorts.

The District Financial Aid Office provides students with options to submit documents securely and remotely through Web-Gate.


Advising and Orientation

Students attended the final virtual PTK orientation for the fall. This provided them with information on the international honor society, membership perks, scholarships, volunteer opportunities, and conferences.







The District Communication Management Center staff assists and disburses incoming calls District-wide. This graph represents a breakdown of how each call was processed.





A community college graduate herself, Dr. Joanne Wittbrodt believes community colleges are a great starting place for students. She states, "The word community really says it; not just in the community the college serves, but that there's a community inside the college." Teaching in the community college became her career goal. "I just love our students. They try so hard. It's not where you start, it's where you end."

Dr. Wittbrodt teaches more than chemistry to her students. "Our job isn't so much teaching the subject we teach. You're trying to be a coach and facilitate what students are trying to do to reach their goals. We help them rise to their best performance level."

She has two key points of advice for her students:

If you feel like you're dealing with someone who is completely irrational, look for the trauma in their lives. Ask questions and let them tell you their story so you can help them.

 Make your life work be something that makes you happy and contribute to others. Make the universe a better place.
 Continue building the community you already have from the community college.

When she isn't teaching, Dr. Wittbrodt tends to a tiny urban farm on her property which has a hoop house, fruit trees, chickens, and ducks. She grows cabbage and makes her own sauerkraut, along with strawberries for jam.

For the first time ever, faculty selection was done virtually rather than in face-to-face mode. The virtual environment featured the following:

- Faculty selecting classes and administrators facilitating the selection process were kept safe at all times.
- The process, in large measure, was very smooth and was completed in one day.
- Both faculty and administrators were familiar with Blackboard. It provided an opportunity to continue demonstrating the flexibility of our learning platform, i.e., call-ins, chat functions, and connection quality for over 500 users in a day.

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
Mobile Apps to Access Learning Resource Centers Electronic Resources






