







Virtual Student Success Toolkit

Student Services Functions ~ Partnerships




The team met to discuss command center processes. The District Command Center is used as one-on-one communication with the students focusing on Spring 2021 registration.




Student Activities

WCCCD ensures a clean and safe environment for students and staff and are complying with applicable college policies, standards and regulatory agency codes.



Granholm in July 2010, and subsequently in January 2020, appointed to the position of Chief Judge by the Michigan Supreme Court. He is the ninth Chief Judge to serve since the creation of the Court by the Michigan Legislature in 1985.

Judge McConico expresses his passion for teaching, "Teaching at WCCCD is especially rewarding because of our diverse student population. I have students who are single parents, those who are fresh out of high school, and even those in their 60s who are all in school to better themselves. I feel lucky that I can be a small part of educating them, inspiring them and helping them with placement in their fields and reaching their goals."

"Instituting the Paralegal Practicum Internship Program has also resulted in some of my greatest joys, having placed many of its participants into full-time employment. Nothing makes me happier than receiving an email from a former Criminal Justice student inviting me to their graduation from police academy or a four-year institution. These are the main reasons for why I teach, as our students are overcoming great challenges that others do not have."

In Judge McConico's limited spare time, he enjoys boating and watching college football (especially Michigan football) with his wife, Jennifer, and three children, Kendall, William, and Ava. He also enjoys coaching basketball, and watching or reading anything concerning World War II and the Civil War.







Curriculum Committee






Pathways to the Future IV Series



DR. RANDALL MILLER SHARES LEADERSHIP THOUGHTS WITH EXECUTIVE TEAM



The Importance of Influence, Priorities, and Character on Leadership

John Maxwell's book, *Developing the Leader Within You 2.0*, discusses ten major principles that he uses to define leadership. I will present a brief summary of those topics over the next several weeks to benefit those who have not read the book and to entice them to consider doing so.

The Definition of Leadership: Influence: Maxwell notes that the most important concept of all is influence. He argues that "one of the best investments you can make in yourself is to develop influence. Why? Because if you have the desire to accomplish something you will be in a better place to do it if others are willing to help."


There are five levels of leadership leading to the pinnacle, where people follow you because of who you are and what you represent. A leader's main responsibility is to use influence to develop other people: "to help them reach their personal potential, to help them do their jobs more effectively, and to help them become leaders themselves."

The Key to Leadership: Priorities: How you use your time reflects your priorities, and we must all ask if they are what we want them to be. Priorities also reveal what you do when nobody is watching. Two of the toughest things to get people to do are to 1) think, and 2) do things in their order of importance. Most of us have challenges juggling multiple priorities and determining their proper order, which is why a quote from Psychologist William James is so relevant: "The art of being wise is knowing what to overlook."

Effective leaders weigh both the importance and urgency of priorities, and high importance and high urgency need to take precedence over priorities that are lower ranked in importance or urgency. As he does throughout the book, Maxwell provides a 'how to' method of determining priorities.


