





# Dr. Christian Nwamba

Dr. Christian Nwamba has been teaching at WCCCD for 28 consecutive years, starting in the summer of 1992 at the Northwest Campus, Greenfield Road location. He currently serves as the interim Faculty Lead for Natural Sciences and is a professor of Introductory Biology and Microbiology for students specializing in the biomedical and allied health fields. He is also the current President of AFT local 2000, an elected position he has held for five years. Dr. Nwamba was born and raised in Nigeria where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Zoology before relocating to the United States in 1983. He earned both a Master of Science in Biology and a Doctor of Philosophy in Molecular Biology and Virology at Wayne State University.

Dr. Nwamba has demonstrated a commitment to student learning as expressed in the article, "Dr. Nwamba: Teaching is Transforming Lives, One Student at a Time," which was published in *The Michigan Citizen* and *Downriver Sunday Times* in 2013. He has received the WCCCD Exceptional Faculty Award in 2013 and 2015 and is a Howard Hughes Medical Institute's Science Education Alliance (HHMI-SEA) trainee and member. He is both a member of, and faculty advisor for, the WCCCD Beta Beta Beta (Tribeta) National Biological Honor Society.

In reflecting on what teaching means to him, Dr. Nwamba said, "My professional teaching career has been driven by my passion to learn and impart knowledge to my students in ways that transforms the student into an enthusiastic thinker, problem solver and life-long learner." He enjoys helping students learn to succeed in their educational endeavors and career pursuits. Each summer, he directs and guides WCCCD science students in the summer water research project and is also a mentor in the WCCCD/University of Michigan Institutional Research and Academic Career Development Award (IRACDA) post-doctoral program

When he is not teaching, Dr. Nwamba enjoys international travel and private times with his family, including his wife, four sons and friends. He also enjoys providing community leadership among his Nigeria-American community members and Igbos within the USA and in his heritage country of Nigeria.







Professor Terrell Thomas (Political Science) received this note from a former student:






#### Resilient/General Education Skills

84% of job postings, no matter the industry, mention at least one of these skills





# Your Contribution to the Team

Much has been written about the value of being on a team of people who desire to serve one another and help the team win together. Championship teams in almost any endeavor of life reflect examples of selfless contributions to the team to accomplish the ultimate goal, whatever that is. The path to that goal invariably includes countless human acts of kindness and assisting other people, all for the benefit of the team.

Marcus Buckingham, in his book *Standout*, shares the results of his extensive research, statistical testing, and analysis of the world's top performers. He states "my hope and dream is that you find a life in which you can get to express the unique spirit that is you, in the most intelligent, most contributive, most meaningful way possible."

One of Buckingham's extraordinary examples of expressing one's unique spirit is of Lionel Messi, an Argentine professional footballer who captains both the Spanish club Barcelona and the Argentina national team. He shows Mr. Messi scoring a goal where he touches the ball nineteen times, eighteen with his left foot and only once with his right foot. His left-footed dominance is so unusual and unique that his coach pressured him to change his style, which resulted in Mr. Messi threatening to quit. Buckingham's point is showing the world's best soccer player with a unique strength and talent who is also a great team player, and where the team strives to help him excel so they can win.

As we all reflect on what strengths and talents we bring to our teams, we should examine our past successes and failures that contribute to defining who we are and what life has taught us. That self-examination helps inform our vision as a leader and helps brings to light our best contributions to our teams.


