




Virtual Career Program Advisory Committee Breakfast


Annual Employee Audit

The audit will be conducted on all campuses, including the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center and the Curtis L. Ivery District Office Building from November 2-4, 2020, from 9.00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.

ALL employees will be required to complete an Employee Verification Form. All employees must present a valid driver license or state identification card and a completed and signed Employee Verification Form to confirm identity before compensation is released on the November 13, 2020 pay date.

WCCCD's Fiscal Year 2022 Five-Year Capital Outlay Plan

This week the deputy chancellor and members of her team submitted the District's Fiscal Year 2022 Statutory Five-Year Capital Outlay Plan. This plan is intended to provide state policymakers with the most current information available on institutional priorities and needs. Given constraints on educational budget funding due to the critical pandemic response, the State will not be accepting major project requests for fiscal year 2022.

Kim DiCaro and members of her team successfully submitted the District's annual Fiscal Operations Report and Application to Participate (FISAP) Report. Our annual FISAP submission reports federal PELL, FSEOG (Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant) and FWS (Federal Work Study) student eligibility and utilization data for our fiscal year.




Guided Pathways




PTK students and staff completed professional development training titled "Research Edge," which trains students on how to properly conduct research.

The WCCCD Redesign Taskforce is currently completing the first milestone which is the Strategy/Discovery Phase. The completed discovery phase of the website redesign was focused on gathering key insights from leadership, faculty, and staff to define the content strategy and focus of the project. Over the course of several weeks, the taskforce participated in workshops focused on Home Page Priorities and Global Navigation, Design and Audience, Voice and Tone. The website launch is anticipated for April 2021.
















Laura Conklin, Retried Nursing Faculty Published her First Book!

Intentional Efforts for Current and Transfer Students for Spring 2021

According to Inside Higher Education (October, 2020), the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center notes enrollment trends for upward transfers, (e.g., students moving from a two-year college to a four-year institution), is on the rise. NEW CIS Programming Language Courses!



CIS 201 C# (C Sharp) Programming Language (Spring 2021)

Data types, control structures, functions, syntax, and semantics of the language, classes, class relationships, and exception handling. This course is an introduction to computer programming for Windows. Emphasis will be on the fundamentals of structured design, development, testing, implementation, and documentation, including language syntax, data and file structures, input/output devices, files, and databases.

CIS 200 Python Programming Language (Fall 2020)

This course covers core programming basics—such as data types, control structures (selection and repetition), algorithm development, and functions—using the Python programming language. In addition, the fundamental principles of Object-Oriented Programming are discussed. Students will solve problems, explore the application of software development challenges, and will create practical applications.



Performance Evaluation Process



DR. RANDALL MILLER SHARES LEADERSHIP THOUGHTS WITH EXECUTIVE TEAM

Leadership at Pearl Harbor

Admiral Chester Nimitz was attending a concert in Washington, D.C. on December 7, 1941 when he was paged and told there was an important call for him. President Roosevelt, following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, called to tell Nimitz he would now be the Commander of the Pacific Fleet.


Admiral Nimitz flew to Hawaii and took a boat tour of the destruction on Christmas Day, 1941. When asked for his reaction, Nimitz said "the Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could ever make, or God was taking care of America," taken from Reflections on Pearl Harbor, by Admiral Chester Nimitz.

Nimitz explained: Mistake number one was the Japanese attacked on Sunday morning when nine out of ten crewmen were ashore on leave. If the ships had been at sea and sunk, losses would have been 38,000 men instead of 3,800.

Mistake number two was the Japanese never bombed the dry docks opposite those ships. Consequently, the ships were in shallow water and could be raised, repaired, and back in operation quickly as opposed to towing them to America to be repaired.

Mistake number three was that every drop of fuel in the Pacific theater of war was in top-of-the-ground storage tanks five miles away over the hill. One attack plane could have strafed those tanks and destroyed the entire fuel supply.

Admiral Nimitz was able to see a silver lining when no one else could during the depths of despair following the devastating attack on American servicemen. He provided optimism and hope for the military and for the country when extraordinary leadership was most desperately needed. President Roosevelt had selected the right leader at the right time.




