

New Fiscal Year Budget Load Process Using the BANNER Budget Development Tool

Budget development at WCCCD is a strategic process, to ensure the alignment of resource allocation to the strategic goals and mission of the District – which is particularly more vital in a multi-campus community college District.

The District's fiscal year begins July 1 and ends June 30 and in accordance with Michigan State laws the budget is submitted for Board approval prior to the commencement of the new fiscal year. The Division of Administration and Finance oversees the entire process – establishes a budget schedule, gathers data from campuses, prepares and reviews the budget, submits it for approval to the Board, posts it online as per the District's Accountability and Transparency Initiatives and continuously evaluates the budget.




Preparing for the Spring 2021 Semester

The One Thing You Can Control Now: Yourself




We are all living with the many uncertainties in life that arise from the pandemic, and we know that, under stress, our brain works overtime to regulate our emotions, attention, and behavior. The length of the quarantine, whether we or our family members will get sick, and when there will be a cure are all unknowns.

There are, however, many things we can control: how we spend our time and with whom, how you care for yourself and your family, how you spend your money, what information you consume, what you eat, and how well you follow safety precautions.

"Self-control- the ability to manage your thoughts, feelings and actions to achieve a goal- is a necessary skill to master in the COVID-19 era. You can't overcome a challenge-big or small-without being disciplined. The Ancient Greeks had a word for the lack of self-control: Akrasia-acting against one's better judgment because of a weakness of will. It's what happens when we succumb to temptation that feels good in the moment, rather than doing something that would be good for us in the long run," states Elizabeth Bernstein, in "The One Thing You Can Control Now: Yourself," *Wall Street Journal*, August 26, 2020.

As we look at the things we can control, it is important to establish priorities to enhance our lives and to improve our ability to lead others. John Maxwell speaks about priority pressures in his book, *Developing the Leader Within You 2.0*, where he lays out principles to help us order our priorities among many good choices. He also offers specific advice on how we can improve self-awareness and grow our emotional intelligence (EQ), which will aid self-control in challenging times.






