- Provides program members the opportunity to discuss and evaluates the strengths and weaknesses of their programs/departments.








What is an OER (Open Educational Resource)?

OER are materials for teaching, training, or research in any form -digital or otherwise- that are in the public domain or have been released under an open license that permits their free access, use, modification, and redistribution by others either with no restrictions or with limited restrictions

A new trend in textbook selection considers the use of Open Educational Resources (OER) which unify access to educational materials for students, reduce student spending, and promote faculty collaboration among other things.




DSS Functions - Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA)

The Division of Student Services (SS) continues to audit and verify certificates, degrees and Michigan Transfer Agreements (MTU) daily. It is a priority that students receive their certificates and degrees in a timely and efficient manner.

The MTA transfer student agreement ensures that a student who completes the MTA Common Core courses at a participating two-year college will have satisfied general education requirements at the participating four-year college. To fulfill the Michigan Transfer Agreement, students must successfully complete at least 30 credits, with at least a 2.0 in each course and at least one credit completed at the institution awarding the MTA. These credits should be met according to the following distribution:

- One course in English Composition
- A second course in English Composition or 1 course in Communications
- One course in Mathematics from one of three pathways: Pathway to Calculus (includes College Algebra), Statistics or Quantitative Reasoning
- Two courses in Social Sciences (from two disciplines)
- Two courses in Humanities and Fine Arts (from two disciplines, excluding studio and performance classes)
- Two courses in Natural Sciences including one with laboratory experience (from two disciplines)






Network Closet Power Redundancy Project Update

Pathways to the Future IV Series Statements of WCCCD's Functions

The Weekend Memo series on WCCCD's values statements has been completed, and this week's article begins a series on the next set of foundational statements: WCCCD's functions. The function statements describe what WCCCD does to achieve its mission, values, and vision. Each function statement defines a major area of institutional programming. Collectively, the function statements present a holistic framework for WCCCD's response to the educational needs of the students, businesses, and communities that it serves. The first function statement defines career education at WCCCD:

Career Education: WCCCD offers associate degree, certificate programs, and individual courses that prepare students for entry-level employment and career advancement.

Brief Reflection: Eli Ginsberg said that "A good job is the first step to human liberation." Most of WCCCD's students indicate that they seek a college credential to get a good job or advance in their careers. WCCCD's career education programs have continuously expanded during the past two decades, and the District is now very well positioned to empower students to get that first good family-supporting job and move forward with their careers. This is especially important as the Wayne County and Southeastern Michigan economy makes the transition to the post-COVID-19 era. The COVID-19 pandemic has decimated the regional economy and many jobs have disappeared never to return. Female, Black, and Latinx workers have been disproportionately impacted as unemployment for these groups grew to nearly double that of other workers during the pandemic. COVID-19 has accelerated a transformation of the world of work that was already underway before the pandemic. The post-COVID-19 era will be one of reskilling and upskilling the regional workforce and of closing the equity gap for marginalized groups. With its open-door philosophy and its history of adapting to the changing educational needs of those served, WCCCD will be an equity-driven community leader in preparing the regional workforce of the future.



This week, the Website Redesign Taskforce held a meeting with the content management systems provider and website design vendor to discuss the catalog, calendar, directory, news search, and project timelines.




Connecting Through Communication

Leaders talk a lot about the importance of communicating effectively to be successful. But what comprises effective communication? One key component that is not discussed much is empathy, or the ability to feel what another person is feeling.

Empathetic leaders are first and foremost in touch with their own emotions, and they are also able to connect with others by feeling what they feel. However, Dr. Henry Cloud notes in his book *Integrity*, it is important to have boundaries whereby leaders realize an appropriate separateness from those they lead. Those boundaries can be critical in building bridges with other people, and they can provide hope for new and positive experiences.

Effective listening is the key for any leader to communicate an understanding of what someone else is feeling. By communicating in a way that other people know they have been understood, leaders can show they are listening effectively and can convey empathy. More importantly, when this occurs, leaders are successful in communicating and establishing a connection.

True communication only occurs when another person knows that you understand and have heard them. This is one of the essential elements of effective leadership: where a leader is able to connect with those he or she is trying to lead instead of just pulling them along and imposing the leader's will. When this occurs, there is a far greater likelihood of effective teamwork, good morale, and achieving successful outcomes.
