






Daily COVID-19 Screening Continues District-wide!


Learning Resource Centers

The Scholar's Corner: Academy Presents "The Next Generation of Teaching and Learning" web forum






Guided Pathways and Future for Frontliners



WCCCD assists students in selecting a program of study, creating a plan to either transfer to a four-year college or get a good job with a two-year degree.

To support these initiatives, WCCCD and Eastern Michigan University (EMU) met to review an opportunity to partner on the Future for Frontliners scholarship program at EMU which would pay for their remaining tuition balance. WCCCD students who are not Pell eligible would receive an award of \$5,000 over four semesters. As part of the initiative, students are required to complete their associate degree prior to transferring and receiving the scholarship at EMU.

Staff participated in the virtual Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity Online Adult Learning Plan Workshop.


Career Planning and Placement

Below are some 2019-20 WCCCD demographics on students enrolled in the American Sign Language Program




Average age 38




Workforce development and continuing education programs in the community college were first introduced in the 1960s and 1970s. This is when community colleges were making the transformation from being primarily campus-based institutions to becoming community-based institutions. Workforce education and continuing education programs venture into new areas of educational service that sometimes evolve into credit-bearing certificate and associate degree programs. Today, WCCCD's flourishing workforce development programs are customized to serve the emerging workforce needs of employers in support of regional economic development, and the continuing education programs respond to the varied occupational and personal enrichment needs of persons of all age groups and income levels.






District Communication Management Center


Leadership with Grace

Many of us have likely experienced examples in life where team members are not pulling their weight or meeting the leader's expectations. While there are many different ways to deal with that scenario, the method that appears to be the most successful is to display leadership with grace.

A leader with grace first and foremost wants the team members to be successful. Rather than turning against individuals who are not reaching the high standards she sets for her people, the leader with grace recognizes that she might need to "provide coaching or training or encouragement or other resources to help them get there," according to Dr. Henry Cloud in his book, *Integrity*.

Similar to parenting, a leader with grace gives support, coaching, teaching, structure, modeling, help, and consequences to empower the team member to get there. The leader provides this support without it being earned, and that is grace. It does not lower or remove the standard; rather, it makes it possible to meet it.

The key to this form of leadership is keeping the high standards while also serving as a force to help others to meet those standards. The other quality that emerges with this approach is trust: leadership with a trustworthy character. Once again, we can see the importance of trust in high-quality and successful leadership.
