



Career Programs

Synchronous learning refers to a learning event in which a group of students are engaging in learning at the same time. Before learning technology allowed for synchronous learning environments (District virtual classroom modality), most online education took place through asynchronous learning methods. While many online educational programs started out as and with the advent of web conferencing tools, people can learn at the same time in different places as well.

For example, use of instant messaging or live chat, webinars and video conferencing allow for students and teachers to collaborate and learn in real time.

The Road from Community College to University Transfer Less Complicated

An article in *Inside Higher Education* emphasized "We simply cannot afford to underutilize the community college transfer pathway as a driver of more equitable college attainment." The District provides multiple avenues to make information available and the student transfer experience a less complicated and confusing process. 



Commercial Driver's License Program

Roundtable Discussion on MIT Detroit Mobility and Work of the Future

Glenda Magarrell and I participated in MIT-CAR Roundtable's Factories of the Future Discussion. The taskforce research focused on the intersection of the central role of manufacturing and community colleges in the American economy and insights into the future of work. Additional research included reviewing:

- Promising sources (e.g., demand, skill sets) of higher wages and job opportunities
- Growth-generating innovation and tech change and technological advances
- International competition,
- COVID-19 crisis and its aftermath

Targeted employer participants included small and medium-sized enterprises— manufacturers and sub-manufacturers that employ less than 500 workers, with limited R&D resources and the need to increase productivity through technological and skill-based interventions (to remain competitive).

The taskforce's goal is to capture some of the important ways in which American industry is changing and its implications for Work of the Future.

Veterans Affairs




Veteran students have expressed interest in WCCCD's Welding Program. Using VA education benefits they will learn the skilled trade of welding.


The School of Continuing Education Silver Circle Programs






