



- Introduced a Curriculum-based Undergraduate Research Experience (CURE) program in my biology classes. A CURE – which can be several weeks long or last the entire 15 weeks - allows students to do an authentic research project that is built around the laboratory curriculum.

Dr. Desiree Meyers feels she has the best job in the world when she is teaching. "There is no better place than the classroom to influence people to go out and change the world. I love motivating and encouraging my students, most of whom are first-generation college students, to pursue science and science education." Dr. Meyers attributes WCCCD as an urban community college for attracting students from diverse backgrounds making it a "great incubator to nurture future scientists and science educators."

Dr. Meyers loves to try new methods of teaching and experimenting, including using different types of technology. She developed the first online science course at WCCCD in 2001, and her online microbiology course has become a model for the other online science courses at WCCCD and surrounding colleges.

Most notably in 2018, Dr. Meyers' Microbiology students from the Downriver Campus isolated a rare bacterium from the boxelder bug as part of their CURE project. The discovery resulted in a publication in 2020:



#### **Career Program Offerings**












#### No Passport required!



The District Student Success Center Team reached out to Michigan Reconnect students remotely. Students were provided online support for the upcoming Flex Entry classes for Spring 2021.





This week the Division of Institutional Effectiveness reviewed national research to assist divisions, programs, and the District regarding the Practical Nursing Education Program.



# Human Resources Frequently Asked Questions

#### What are the tuition waiver benefits, and how do I apply for them?

As part of the employee benefit package employees can take classes at WCCCD through a tuition waiver program. Applicable forms can be found on the District website under Division of Human Resources.

#### How do I view my address, benefits, vacation, or other personnel information?

Once your information is submitted by employees it can be viewed in employee Web-Gate. Web-Gate: https://webgate.wcccd.edu

#### How do I set up or change direct deposit for my employee payroll?

You may set up direct deposit during your Onboarding appointment during the hiring process or edit and add a direct deposit account by submitting a Direct Deposit of Pay - Employee Authorization Agreement form to Human Resources.

#### What is the Health Care Flexible Spending Account?

A Health Care Flexible Spending Account allows you to put aside pre-tax dollars to assist and pay for health care expenses.

Upon leaving the College, when will my health, vision, and dental insurance expire? Medical benefits will expire on the last day of employment.


#### What is COBRA?

The Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA) is the administrative process that occurs when a covered participant under the active group health coverage loses coverage because of a certain event, such as termination, ineligible dependent status, etc. When the group health coverage is lost, you can buy back the medical, dental, prescription, or health flexible spending account for a specific period of time at 102% of the premium per month. You have all the same rights as when you were an active employee, i.e., you can participate in Open Enrollment and must abide by the same rules as when you were active such as qualifying events, etc..

#### **How do I retrieve W-2 Forms from a Previous Tax Year?**

To access your previous years W-2, please go to your employee Web-Gate and click on Tax Forms and select a year to retrieve your W-2 forms.














#### Website Redesign Taskforce



#### DR. RANDALL MILLER SHARES LEADERSHIP THOUGHTS WITH EXECUTIVE TEAM



#### The Importance of Mentors

We have all read and heard much about Abraham Lincoln's life and particularly his leadership during the Civil War. What is less known and discussed are the individuals who helped shape his life and thinking in his early years and how Lincoln was so successful at educating himself.


Michael Gerhardt, a professor of jurisprudence at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, focuses in his new book, *Lincoln's Mentors*, on five men and their impact on Lincoln. His first two mentors, fellow westerners Henry Clay and Andrew Jackson, helped steer him into law as a career. Henry Clay's political oratory impressed Lincoln as he saw how important it was to speak the language of and relate to the common people. Andrew Jackson's ferocious defense of the Union against secessionists provided a model for President Lincoln as he was determined to preserve the Union during the Civil War.

Gerhardt argues that Lincoln found a "model of executive pragmatism in his third mentor, Zachary Taylor, who broke old alliances and compromised his ideals to achieve concrete political ends. 'Old Rough and Ready' was determined to carry the fight to the enemy."

The last two of Lincoln's mentors were of a more personal nature. John Todd Stuart, cousin of Lincoln's wife, helped guide him into the legal profession and helped launch his political career. Orville Browning was a "friend and fellow member of the early Republican Party to whom Lincoln turned for advice on all manner of subjects from the difficulties of marriage to the challenges of managing a cabinet."

What becomes very clear in studying Lincoln's life and career is that perhaps more than any other president, Abraham Lincoln grew in office and his self-education never ceased. He may be the very best role model possible for those of us committed to higher education and improving the lives of others as well as how mentors can improve one's own life.




