WAYNE COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT'S "NEW DAY, NEW WAY" INITIATIVE GIVES 50 PERCENT OFF TUITION FOR SPRING SEMESTER 2021

INITIATIVE ACTIVE TO ALL WHO REGISTER BY JANUARY 19, 2021

Wayne County Community College District will reduce tuition by 50 percent across all academic and career programs for students who register between Jan. 1 and Jan. 19, 2021 for the Spring Semester. The tuition relief is a part of a give back initiative called "New Day, New Way".

The tuition relief begins Jan. 1, 2021 and extends to Jan. 19, 2021. WCCCD students who have already registered for the Spring 2021 semester prior to January 1, 2021 will receive 50 percent off tuition for either the Summer or Fall 2021 semester.

Interested individuals can visit the WCCCD website at wcccd.edu to explore programs, and to start the application and registration process.

"Our mission has always been to help people find pathways to better lives through higher education," said WCCCD Chancellor Dr. Curtis L. Ivery. "Tens of thousands of individuals across our region are leaving 2020 behind with a deep need and desire to turn towards something better. We are here to help them find an opportunity that allows them to grow, their families to grow, and their communities to thrive."

Division of Institutional Effectiveness What Works?

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) conducts local research to assist the District with improving the programs and services offered to students. In a study conducted by Civitas Learning, who analyzed roughly 1,000 initiatives assessed by more than 55 unique institutions. The way the student service initiatives were deployed and managed contributed to student successes. The Division collects data from student surveys to understand their needs and how to improve services to support District support services.







First Cohort of 2021





Staff are assisting students with Adult Education Spring 2021 registration and orientation.




Future for Frontliners Scholarship Program



Captain Holmes, Lieutenant Duneske, and Corporal Barton conducted inspections of the District Police Authority filing system and patrol vehicles.





State Legislative Matters

Governor Signs Virtual Meeting Extension

Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed into law Senate Bill 1246, which extends the allowance allow for public boards to be able to meet virtually without limitation until March 31, 2021. The new law also clarifies that boards meeting in person must comply with safety limitations including distancing and limits on the number of people physically in attendance.

COVID Relief Supplemental Signed with Vetoes

Governor Whitmer signed into law Senate Bill 748, but not without vetoing a significant portion of the funding originally authorized by the bill. Fortunately for community colleges, the Governor left in the signed law the construction authorizations for four community college capital outlay projects that previously had received planning authorizations, although she did veto planning authorizations for two new university projects.

Federal Legislative Matters

Federal Stimulus Deal Signed

In late December, Congress passed a massive bill that included Coronavirus supplemental spending along with final fiscal year (FY) 2021 appropriations and a host of other measures. President Trump has now signed the legislation into law. Below is information on three of the bill's key components.


- Coronavirus Supplemental Funding: The legislation provides \$22.7 billion to higher education, substantially more than was contained in the CARES Act. The legislation builds on CARES but has differences that are generally beneficial. Community colleges will benefit from this legislation, including a movement towards funding institutions on headcount rather than FTE.
- FY 2021 Final Appropriations: Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 final funding is largely steady, but there are significant pluses. These include a \$150 increase in the Pell Grant maximum, to \$6,495; a \$52 million increase in the Carl Perkins Act; sustained funding for the NSF's ATE program; and an increase in DOL's Strengthening Community College Training Grant program.
- FAFSA Simplification: The FAFSA has been shortened and the application process more tightly integrated with the tax system. This should significantly facilitate community college participation in the federal student aid programs. The legislation rewrites the need analysis system and pumps more money into the Pell Grant program. Finally, the legislation includes "Second Chance Pell," allowing incarcerated students enrolled in non-profit institutions to receive the grants. This is an astonishing political development, due in significant part to our community's advocacy.




The Indispensable Quality of Leadership: Vision

The first installment for 2021 of leadership tips from John Maxwell's book, *Developing the Leader Within You 2.0,* includes a summary of chapter eight, "The Indispensable Quality of Leadership: Vision."

Vision provides a road map for leaders to set direction, remain focused, and prioritize both action and values. Most organizations have a vision statement in addition to their mission statement. Those statements help the organizations and their leaders to be focused on their desired outcomes. Leaders are people who see a vision, pursue that vision, and help others to see and pursue it. "Couple a vision with a leader willing to implement that dream, and a movement begins," e.g., the community college movement vigorously endorsed and advanced by John Rouche and Terry O'Banion.

As quickly as things move in most organizations today, the need to change and adapt is essential to success for any effective leader. "With that kind of pace, a leader's ability to see more than others and before others allows him or her not to be fixated on what is now, but to focus on what will be in the future."

People need direction and a path to follow, and they want and need to know that their leader knows the way forward where they want to go. However, it is important for leaders to recognize that achieving a great vision does not happen quickly; it takes time and great effort. Consequently, leaders need to allow people time to "be refreshed mentally, emotionally, and physically" along the way. It took time for the people of Spain to change their world vision in accepting that there really was a new world beyond Spain's Straits of Gibraltar because of the vision of Christopher Columbus. That historical example should serve as a metaphor for what is possible for any leader who displays vision and knows how to bring people along to experience the positive results.


