Michigan Moves to Next Phase of COVID-19 Vaccination

On Monday, the state began vaccinating residents 65 and older along with frontline workers, including teachers and child care providers. The announcement marks an acceleration in the original vaccination plan. It is also moving forward with additional frontline workers, including teachers, child care workers and other frontline workers, like police officers. MCCA staff are working with the Governor's Office and MDHHS to clarify the priority for community college faculty and staff, especially in occupational and other hands-on fields, and to ensure that they are prioritized as highly as possible.

News from the Michigan Community College Association

As a reminder, the Michigan COVID-19 Vaccination Interim Prioritization Guidance prioritizes individuals differently depending on their roles. Students and others in clinical health care settings would fall into Phase 1A and have been eligible for vaccination. The status of faculty and staff whose work must be performed on site is being clarified as they are essential workers. Other students and staff will become eligible for vaccination as their age and health status dictates. The state continues to share vaccine resources online at www.michigan.gov/covidvaccine. As well, it continues to be a good idea to work closely with your local public health department.





Year-end Reconciliation of Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) Leave



Division of Institutional Effectiveness Impact of COVID-19 on Adult Learners

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) conducts local research to assist the District with improving the programs and services offered to students. Education Advisory Board (EAB), a firm that partners with institutions to promote student progress, recently surveyed current and prospective students to help institutions better understand the changing dynamics that have resulted from the impact of COVID-19 on adult learners. 
In Fall 2020, WCCCD conducted a Welcome Back Student Experience Survey which captured, among other variables, the impact of COVID-19 on WCCCD students. Below are the top three areas where students reported the greatest challenges due to the pandemic.



Adult Learners Projections

Adult learners are often referred to as non-traditional students. According data released by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) prior to the pandemic, students who are 25 to 34 years are projected to increase **11%** by 2026. Those over 35 years old and older are projected to increase **4%** by 2026.

















Website Redesign

District Communication Management Center






The District Communication Management Center staff assists and disburses incoming calls District wide. This graph represents a breakdown of how each call was processed.








The Voice of Faculty Excellence

The Price Tag of Leadership: Self-Discipline

This week's leadership tips from John Maxwell's book, *Developing the Leader Within You 2.0*, includes a summary of Chapter 9, "The Price Tag of Leadership: Self-Discipline."


Mr. Maxwell provides countless pearls of wisdom in his book, and one of his most relevant truths for life is that "everything worthwhile is uphill." He declares that "there are no such things as accidental achievements, and everything you desire in life, everything you would like to strive for, is uphill, meaning the pursuit of it is challenging, grueling, exhausting, strenuous, and difficult."

Self-discipline enables you to go uphill because any climb uphill must be "deliberate, consistent, willful, and very intentional." It moves you from good intentions to good actions as we 'walk the talk,' and thereby achieve sustained success from consistency.

Tests of character and will come to us when we are hardest hit, and that is precisely when we must not quit. When going through trials, it is best to focus not on what you are going through, but rather on what you are going to. That way you can keep focused on the goal.

One of my favorites comes from Rory Vaden's Pain Paradox: "the short-term easy leads to the long-term difficult, while the short-term difficult leads to the long-term easy." Cutting corners and taking the easy path most often creates a life that is extremely difficult.

John Maxwell's most cogent observation is that "bad thinking results in bad habits, and good thinking results in good habits," and his best wish for people is to help them think in such a way that their choices result in uphill habits.
