




The Ethiopian Consul General to Midwest Ambassador Abdulaziz Mohammed Visits WCCCD

Educational Affairs Operational Excellence Continuous Improvement

As faculty and students settle into the semester, a few observations are necessary.

- There are fewer calls and emails this semester to Educational Affairs with concerns about students who are having problems connecting to class
- If there are connection problems for students, the issues are getting resolved quickly, sometimes in minutes
- There are fewer calls and emails to Educational Affairs from faculty members about access to their courses and any issues that do occur are being resolved in short order
- Faculty members are letting us know when they
 think a student is having a technology issue or resource issue, and if Educational Affairs can't
 help, we pass it off to the IT team who is supporting us and they are responding in a timely
 manner.



Summer II classes and Guest Students



The Summer semester is a time the college offers courses specifically designed for guest students and those looking to get a jump on their academic goals. While the regular summer courses run 13 weeks (already shorter than the standard 15-week semester courses in fall and spring) the Summer II courses run for only 8 weeks.



Weekend College offers a wide variety of courses on Friday evenings and Saturday mornings and afternoons for busy people who are on the go. If you have weekday and/or weeknight commitments that make it difficult for you to attend regularly scheduled weekday classes, Weekend College may be a good way for you to make progress toward completing your degree. This cohort design enables working adults to perform comfortably and successfully as students and meet their family and personal obligations at the same time.



Rethinking the Learning Resources Centers (LRC)



When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in early 2020, libraries across the world had to quickly rethink their physical presence in order to limit the potential transmission of the virus. LRC patrons were not be spending hours browsing the library stacks in person. The District took the following actions:

- LRC remain open as an access issue for students to use the District's WIFI and computers networks
- Increased the number EBooks, EJournals and EPeriodical into the District's holdings
- Increased access to films and videos online offered through our Learning Management System (LMS)

The result was the District experience a 90% increase in our circulation activities. Which has led to Educational Affairs

HR Compliance: Year-End Assignment Audit




The Website Redesign Taskforce has been meeting regularly to discuss content editing and migration as well as a review process for PDF documents on the website.




DEVELOPING EXCEPTIONAL INSTINCTS

You may be surprised to learn that because Michael Dell was painfully shy, his workers viewed him as aloof, and many were ready to quit. Only once he crossed the threshold of recognizing he needed help did he seek honest feedback. Taking that step by the CEO and acting on that feedback turned Dell into one of the best and most successful corporations in America.

But there are many factors that get in the way of leaders taking that bold step. Fear of the truth about ourselves and character issues top the list. "Fear of acknowledging one's faults, a fixed view of one's self from past experiences, a lack of skills or resources to address what you find, or a need for a total rework of one's life plan" are the character issues that get in the way, according to Dr. Henry Cloud in his book, Integrity.

Fear and these character issues often get in the way of taking important growth steps in life. By avoiding the truth of our own personal reality, we can miss out on great opportunities in life. Winners have the fortitude and character to seek both positive and negative truths about themselves. They seek both, even the kind that would stretch them out of their comfort zone.




