I came to Wayne County Community College District after graduating high school because I lacked confidence in my ability to do well in college. While at WCCCD, I enrolled in a




After graduating from WCCCD, I graduated Summa Cum Laude from the University of Detroit Mercy with a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science.




Detroit at Work Career Center






New Podcast Available!

Speed Up Your Typing with Text Replacement

Text replacement allows you to set up shortcuts to replace longer phrases, like "GM" for "Good morning!" You can do this with common phrases or customize them.

On an iPhone:

• Go to Settings > General > Keyboard > Text Replacement

• Tap the plus icon, then enter your phrase and shortcut. Tap Save.

For Android, you can do this using the Google Keyboard:

• Open Gboard's Settings > Dictionary > Personal dictionary and choose your language.

• To add, tap the plus sign. In the first field, type in the word or phrase you want Gboard to remember. In the second field, type in the short code you want to pull it up.


Website Redesign Taskforce

Staff is working on the annual report that includes the number of new international students, retention students, Optional Practical Training students and the guest students for 2020-2021.




Police Authority Oversight Council


Reality Rules in Leadership

I have always been impressed with the honor oath at the United States Air Force Academy that states "We will not Lie, Steal, or Cheat, nor tolerate among us anyone who does." That is a powerful oath and clearly communicates that the highest level of integrity is expected among the ranks of soon-to-be-commissioned officers.

If everyone told the truth, there would be no scandals in business or in higher education. But truth be told, we all know of examples of telling "little white lies." Sometimes it is because we don't want to hurt people's feelings by telling the truth, or sometimes small lies are told to benefit ourselves.

When discussing leadership, the terms character and integrity inevitably are mentioned. Dr. Henry Cloud, in his book *Integrity*, notes that "to have character integrity is to tell the truth, no matter the costs. In fact, truthfulness is really measured in terms of our tendency to tell it when it hurts in some way. People fudge or lie when there is a risk of some sort of loss or negative consequence."

As we have likely all learned in life, hiding the truth usually results in more negative consequences than if we had told the truth. Experience tells us that we tend to trust others until they prove to us by their actions that they cannot be trusted. When someone lies to us, the reality is that person most likely has permanently damaged our relationship. The net result is a loss of trust. Effective leadership depends upon relationships based upon trust. That is the reality of leadership!



Pathways to the Future IV Statements of WCCCD's Functions

Statement functions are foundational and enduring statements describing what is done on an ongoing basis to carry out the District's mission, values, and vision. Each function statement defines a major area of institutional programming. Collectively, the function statements present a holistic framework for WCCCD's response to the educational needs of the students, businesses, and communities it serves.

The fifth function statement defines what WCCCD does in the areas of Student Support Services. Additional student support services include advising, student activities (including student government), and assisting students with articulation to baccalaureate colleges and universities. The Student Services Division has been leading the focus on a guided pathways initiative based on four pillars of the flow of students through WCCCD: (1) clarify the pathway; (2) help students get on a path; (3) help students stay on their path; and (4) ensure students are learning.




