


WCCCD Students Bioengineer E.coli to Glow!



E.coli bacteria do not naturally glow when exposed to ultraviolet light. However, students taking microbiology with Desiree Meyers, Ph.D., bioengineered E.coli cells by inserting a jellyfish gene into their DNA to enable them to glow bright green. The image below shows agar plates of genetically modified E.coli glowing under UV light. This is a first for WCCCD students!

New Day, New Way Initiative




The New Day, New Way Call Center continues to provide high quality customer service to our callers. As of week 73, the team has assisted more than 45,000 callers.


How to Inspire and Retrain Good People















Right in Time for the Holiday Season!

News from the Michigan Community College Association

House of Representatives Pass the Build Back Better Act

On Friday, November 19, 2021, the House of Representatives passed HR 5376, the Build Back Better Act. This is the reconciliation legislation that Democrats have been working on to advance President Biden's Build Back Better Agenda.

Free or Low-Cost Childcare to 105,000 More Kids and Working Families

Governor Gretchen Whitmer announced that 105,000 more children and their families are now eligible for free or low cost childcare. Families are eligible if they have a qualifying need (like working or going to school), make less than 185% of the federal poverty level (\$49,000 for a family of 4), and have a child under age 12.

House Education and Labor Committee Holds Hearing on Implementation of Covid-19 Education Funds

On Wednesday November 17, 2021, two House Education and Labor subcommittees - Early Childhood, Elementary, and Secondary Education Subcommittee; and Higher Education and Workforce Investment Subcommittee – held a joint subcommittee hearing entitled Examining the Implementation of COVID-19 Education Funds.

House Hearing on Community College BSN Authority

MCCA staff have learned that the Chair of the House Education Committee, Rep. Pamela Hornberger, would like to schedule a hearing on House Bills 5556 and 5557, the community college Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) legislation. The hearing will take place on Tuesday, November 30, 2021 at 9:00 a.m., in room 521 of the House Office Building.
