Avoid being scammed!

Phishing scams are usually emails that appear to originate from a trusted source in order to trick a user into entering valid credentials or attempt to lure them into revealing their username, password and other personal information.

How to spot phishing/scam emails?

- Emails demanding urgent action
- Emails with unexpected attachments such as invoice, reports etc. from familiar or unfamiliar source
- Unexpected email with links requesting to reset your password or personal information
- Emails with bad grammar or spelling
- Too good to be true emails
- Fake delivery notifications
- Online document signing (Docusign)
- Tax delinquency or payment request

When you receive such emails, the best thing you can do is to delete it both from your inbox and your deleted messages folder. If you are not sure, please contact the IT helpdesk.

EXERCISE THE PAIN OF SELF-DISCIPLINE

According to John Maxwell in his book *Developing* the Leader Within You 2.0, "there are two types of pain in life: the pain of self-discipline, which is eased by doing the right thing, and the pain of regret, which aches until we die." Those of us who have become leaders recognize that with no pain there is no gain.

"Self-discipline is developed by saying yes when we want to say no and saying no when we want to say yes." It is hard to face the negative things in our lives. It is much easier to put off that action. That is why procrastination has become so common: it is easy- or so many people think.

Winners and successful leaders are willing to work through the pain of self-discipline because they


have the vision to understand that is the prudent action. Enduring some of that pain is the price they know they must pay to get what they want.

Early in his career and after his first Masters victory, Tiger Woods made a hard choice. He sought the best coaching he could find and worked to perfect his already outstanding game. That commitment to being the best is what made him such an extraordinary player.
