

The team also met with MDOT and Mark Grazioli to plan the academic component of the Civil Testing and Technology Program.









Twin Crises Drive Change When historians reflect on 2020 and 2021, two transformative events will come to mind: the killing of George Floyd and the COVID-19 pandemic. 



How to be a Better Problem Solver

If we are interested in growing, we cannot only spend time with the familiar and what we like. Instead, we must also seek out the unfamiliar. We can do that by leaving our comfort zone and exploring things that we would not usually pursue, notes Amy E. Herman in *Fixed, How to Perfect the Fine Art of Problem-Solving.* When we figure out what we are drawn to and what repulses us, we will begin to get a more accurate picture of who we are. As we begin to form a more accurate look at ourselves, warts and all, we will position ourselves to become better problem solvers. When we learn more about and acknowledge our own strengths and weaknesses, we can recognize and confront our own biases and overcome them. Most of us think we have far fewer biases than the average person, which is a phenomenon known as 'bias blind spot.' We tend to overestimate our good qualities and underestimate our bad qualities. The best way to get to the truth we don't hold to be self-evident about ourselves is to ask our co-workers. Ultimately, gaining that insight will make us better problem solvers.


