
READING CAN CHANGE YOUR LIFE

While we take seriously a long list of books on leadership and management, reading of another sort may help us with the ability to feel and express empathy and compassion for others.

David A. Bell, in his book, *Men on Horseback*, speaks of how readers could get "voyeuristic glimpses into the private thoughts, experiences, and emotions of real people leading emotionally intense lives." He encouraged readers to develop close emotional relationships with genius characters to learn from their experiences.

Denis Diderot, a French philosopher in the Age of Enlightenment, explained how he thought "the experience of novel-reading could change lives. Novels could create so perfect an allusion, he wrote, that readers could feel like children taken to the theater for the first time, unable to distinguish between literary artifice and reality."

As educators who interact with and influence many other people, it is both important and valuable to read broadly, including a wide range of sources and topics to diversify our knowledge, understanding, and outlook. That continuous process of reading proves over and over how it can and does change our lives.



What's Trending: Advancing Mobility for Adult Learners

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) reviews national data to support the District with program offerings and service. According to an article entitled, "Moving Up and Moving Forward – Advancing Mobility for Adult Learners," adults who return to higher education see a 140% larger increase in average annual salary than those who do not go back to school, and their upward mobility is 22% greater (56% vs. 46%)."

Staff from the Division of Information Technology met with team members from the Ted Scott Campus to discuss upgrades for the Computers and Advanced Technologies Center.






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Mission
