





What's Trending: Reasons Students Attend





DATA CLOSET RE-ENGINEERING PROJECT CURTIS L. IVERY DISTRICT OFFICE







THE MAKEUP OF YOUR CHARACTER REALLY MATTERS

Dr. Henry Cloud tells the story in his book *Integrity*, of how one of his partners bought Coldwell Banker Residential, which was losing money, from Sears for \$150 million. Understanding the importance of helping others to develop, the partner and his team "established Coldwell Banker University for leadership training, seeing the development of their people as the best thing that they could do to grow the company."

This quickly became a huge success story because after one year the partners paid back the \$100 million they had borrowed and, three years later, sold the company for \$650 million. While a great turnaround story, it is even a better endorsement of the importance of investing in people.

The success story did not arise from a business school case study. Rather, it was a reflection of the character of the principal partner. He was a mentor of high school and college students, and it had just become part of his makeup. While his actions resulted in hundreds of millions in profit, the prime motivation was to help develop others, which had become such an important expression of his character. Clearly, this story shows that the makeup of your character really matters in many different and valuable ways.




