


Community Update at the New Culinary Arts and Hospitality Center





How can I check my leave balances?

You can view all of your current leave balances and history by accessing your Web-Gate account.

How do I update my address?

If you are a current employee (full or part-time), you will need to fill out the online Employee Address Change request form. This form can be found on the intranet under business forms.

How do I update my name?

Before we can change your name in the system, you must apply for a new Social Security Card and bring a copy to the Division of Human Resources.


What benefits are available to employees?

Changes made to your insurance must be done during open enrollment or within 30 days of a qualifying event.






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Mission
