


First Board of Trustees Meeting for 2024!


































I met with Reverend Wendell Anthony and Gary Torgow, Chairman of the Board of Directors of Huntington Bank, to discuss community participation opportunities.


The Commercial Driver's License Training Program held the first orientation of the new year at the Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus.




Documentary Film Viewing Meeting



Are You Afraid to Delegate?

A career in higher education, like most fields, is a progression of experiences. We start out at the baseline with little or no experience, and we build from there. Learning to be part of a team is an important part of the growth experience. Opening yourself up to others in a new situation hopefully will bring positive results. But it can sometimes result in being betrayed by someone on the team. Unfortunately, when that occurs, your ability to trust others may be negatively affected. Dr. Henry Cloud notes in *Integrity*, that this kind of experience may result in "being afraid to delegate, fearful of not seeing everything, and being a little suspicious anytime you are out of the loop." This is not how high performers operate, and to overcome this you may need a safe place to learn to confide in others. If you are in survival mode, always watching your back, you are not able to develop new aspects of your character other than perseverance.




Facilities Response Sequence
