


Freedom **Point** Project

We look forward to providing more information about this exciting initiative in the coming weeks.


































Livonia-Westland Community Leaders Forum








The District Student Services Executive Team met to discuss logistical records preparations for the graduation related ceremonies and rituals.




Considine Center Hiring Fair

Staff continues reviewing records for new transfer students.






Dual Enrollment

Looking Beyond our Genes

Since genes are real determinants of behavior, a common joke is "pick your parents well," knowing full well we have no say in that decision. While our genetic makeup is what it is, fortunately there are many determinants that contribute to our character and integrity. Genes/temperament are two of those determinants, but so are past experiences and things we can learn along life's path to impact our behavior.

There are many reasons why we are the way we are, but Dr. Henry Cloud in *Integrity* asks the question, "regarding your adult life, what are you going to do about it?" If you have areas of your life that are going well, that is great. What about those areas that need attention or changing? You are the one who can alter your experience to make new choices that build the kind of character that will enable you to meet life's demands. As you grow and learn, you can "negotiate more and more of the realities that you face and, as you do, realize more of who you were created to be."



Institutional Effectiveness

What's Trending: Co-requisite Education

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) met to discuss drivers for enrollment and student success. The Division of Educational Affairs and general education faculty pioneered the District's efforts to help students matriculate through remediation and general studies course requirements. The co-requisite model was fully implemented in Fall 2023 to adapt and expedite student remediation needs. MAT 1130 and ENG 1190 were designed to facilitate general education pre-requisite completion to advance students towards seamless completion.



The effects of remediation courses include some of the following points:

Increased cost of attendance

Not credit bearing

Extensive time in gateway course completion pipeline

Increased time to completion

Increased likelihood of withdrawal & stop out

IE discussed the co-requisite model course pathways as driver for successful degree completion and plan to analize findings to better measure co-requisite education outcomes.

Co-Requisite Model Outcomes



There was a 44% increase in students who enrolled in the Co-Requisite English and Math courses








Podcast #28 Now Available!








Detroit Fine Arts Breakfast Club Meeting


