














Detroit Drives Degree Community College Collaborative (D3C3) Presidents' Discussion

As a life-long learner, she values the importance of continuing the pursuit of knowledge and learning new skills. She states, "I teach because I feel that I, myself, am still a student. What motivates me to teach is the love for mathematics and the opportunity to inspire my students to become life-long learners." Professor Karic is equity-minded in her approach to instruction. "Students bring to the classroom different levels of attitude, ability, and motivation, which are often supplemented by fear of taking math." Her goal is to remove those barriers to support her students' success in life.

Professor Karic currently serves as the Co-Discipline Lead for the Math and Physics course clusters. Professor Karic, with her Co-Lead Joy Charles, led a team of math faculty in their efforts to rethink math curriculums, beginning with their developmental education offering. "It is my hope that my students leave my class excited by and knowledgeable in mathematics and assured that I care about them and their success."

Staff continue to reach out to students to assist with Summer 2024 registration and the Phi Theta Kappa application process.








Professional Development

Staff met to review graduate applications and other necessary preparations for students completing their degree and/or certificates.







Federal Work-Study Program

PTK members folded more than 500 bags for the annual nationwide National Association of Letter Carriers Food Drive in partnership with Gleaners.



Dr. Fidelis D'Cunha was honored for her work with immigrant women and diversity, equity and inclusion at the Michigan International Women's Conference.






CONNECTING MINORITY COMMUNITIES GRANT (CMG) PROJECT UPDATE
