





The Northwest Campus team met with members of the Website Redesign Taskforce to complete a comprehensive content review of the campus pages on the new website.









demanding nuanced understanding and empathy. Beyond academia, Dr. Cheeks is dedicated to his role as a facilitator and therapist, striving to empower students and individuals battling emotional conflicts and addiction.

Before embarking on his teaching journey, Dr. Cheeks served as a Criminal Investigator for the State of Michigan and the Detroit Police Department, showcasing his commitment to public service.

Known for his keen attention to detail and collaborative spirit, Dr. Cheeks is a staunch advocate for diversity and inclusivity.

At his core, Dr. Cheeks is a man of faith and compassion, deeply devoted to both his spiritual beliefs and lending a helping hand to the less fortunate.

Since 2011, he has been an integral part of the WCCCD community, leaving an indelible mark on both colleagues and students alike.

For Dr. Cheeks, the highlight of his tenure lies in teaching dual enrollment classes. Witnessing the transformation of high school students as they engage with college-level material fills him with a sense of pride and fulfillment. He relishes the opportunity to instill confidence and optimism in young minds. With academic credentials including a Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctor of Ministry degree, Dr. Cheeks brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise to his teaching endeavors.






Dr. Wanda Hudson and Diane Gonzalez represented the District at Macomb Community College for a

lively discussion by FANUC and its education leaders about how automation is changing the landscape of the institutional workforce in Michigan and how education across the state should respond.








Textbook Links
