





UNOFFICIAL GROUP LEADER

It is fascinating to observe group dynamics, particularly in official business meetings. Titles and positions often don't determine who emerges as the unofficial leader as much as that person's ability to resolve a challenge the group is facing.

Early in my career and while serving on the Chancellor's Cabinet at Anchorage Community College, one senior administrator consistently emerged as the group leader because of his problem-solving ability and his ability to make decisions. His interesting background included serving as an Infantry officer in Viet Nam where he clearly survived because he had those skills.

The role this administrator served at the College was as a peer to most others on Cabinet except the Chancellor, but all the others consistently deferred to him to solve the most vexing problems. He did not have an ego investment in that reality; rather, he was a team player who wanted to make the best contribution possible for the success of the College.


















U.S. Customs and Border






