

The Northwest Campus, in partnership with the United Michigan Muslim Association (UMMA), hosted a community lunch in the Denise Wellons Glover Welcome Center.




























The Dirty Work of Producing Rice

Rice is a staple food in Thailand. It is sometimes consumed three times a day – breakfast, lunch and dinner.



The Thais use buffalos to do the heavy lifting in the production.

On our host's farm, the students harvested honey from the bee hives and prepared the afternoon lunch, and drank sugar cane juice.



KISSING THE ELEPHANT!

I was born in the African village of Jakakehn, in Liberia, West Africa. There, we literally lived among some of the wildest animals; including elephants, the largest among the animal world. But not once did I ever come in close proximity with them until the most recent educational Study Abroad experience to Thailand; where one of the most profound memories was students learning about cultural significance of the River Kwai.

There I saw lanterns that brought back memories when I was growing up in Africa. Then, only those who had money owned lanterns because the ordinary person could not afford to find money to buy kerosene. For light at night, they depended on the fireplace in the house, or a torch to find their way around. It was not the lanterns; the floating raft; or the combination of a place to shower and the toilet that is worth remembering. It was the elephant that came every morning to eat from the hands of the students. There is a saying that elephants have long memories and that elephants never forget. This one elephant with his or her trainer, came every morning at exactly 8:00 am to feed from the hands of the students...those who are brave to get closer to the animal, that is.

This man from the village of Jakakehn was not going to be the only one who did not get close to the elephant, or feed the animal from the palm of his hands. So I gathered courage, picked from the container of leftover fruits from the morning's breakfast and walked down the squeaking bridge to where I was an arms length to the elephant that was standing in the river.

The students cheered me on to get closer. "Closer, closer," I could hear them say. So I got braver each time and got closer to the animal. First I tried to feed it with a piece of leftover pineapple, but this did not go well. The piece of fruit fell into the water. Then I picked a cucumber, and this time I was able to find the trunk as the animal grabbed the piece of fruit from my hand. In other words, to say "nice boy or girl," I had to get even closer and the elephant was able to rub its trunk on my cheek. At that time, all I could hear were the clicking sounds of cameras as everyone was taking photos. The story from there is that I "kissed the elephant, or should I say, he kissed me!"
