

Shining Light on the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center

When speaking with Denis Karic, Provost of the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center (MESUC), you can sense the passion he feels advocating for our students as he helps them explore educational pathways with our partners. He inspires that same enthusiasm and commitment from his team.

Mr. Karic continues to meet with MESUC partners to explore programs to help our students get a four-year degree. He is constantly working to communicate the enormous savings our students can enjoy by taking 90 credits at WCCCD and then only having to pay for one year at their university partner's tuition rate. This is the benefit of the 3 + 1 plan for MESUC students.

Currently we have nine university partners, and of those, Ferris State University (FSU) has a staff member on site at the MESUC. Because of the personal attention their students receive, several hundred students have transferred to FSU to complete their degrees in criminal justice.

Another success story is the University of Michigan-Flint, which has students enrolled in the Bachelor of Science-Nursing program to improve their job and promotional opportunities in the very hot field of Nursing.

The MESUC and the MESUC - Center for Learning Technology offer classes through Distance Learning each semester. To support those students, we have developed a system for providing textbooks online for all those classes as a result of partnerships with McGraw-Hill and Cengage.

A final bright spot at the MESUC is the Diverse Learners program, which supports students with learning disabilities. Offering programs in Art, Cake Decorating, Music, and Yoga; this is a community service helping to bridge the gap between youth and adulthood for students with special needs, and it underscores the impact of our MESUC.



The Division of Information Technology is undertaking a comprehensive technology infrastructure upgrade to enhance network performance, reliability, and capacity across all facilities. This project includes the replacement and upgrading of existing network switches to ensure they meet current and future bandwidth demands, improve network efficiency, and support advanced network management capabilities.

In addition to the switch upgrades, the project will involve a complete redesign of the wireless network to improve coverage, capacity, and performance. This redesign will incorporate the deployment of new, high-performance wireless access points in all District buildings to support the increasing number of devices, online learning tools, and administrative systems that rely on wireless connectivity.


Budget, Facilities and Human Resources Council Meeting





